HAS IT BEEN THAT LONG?

Yes, it's been 2 years since I was Licensed and Installed as your Parish Priest and I'm still getting to know folk and the different communities that make up 'my area' – the Washburn and Mid Wharfe United Benefice – and still being introduced as 'the new Vicar'.

It's great to have finally moved into Leathley Rectory, despite it happening in the run up to Christmas and scaffold planks blowing down onto Julie's car. Julie is currently practising with the Aga – and I'm tasting what hasn't been burnt!

Yes, it's been 10 months since Camilla and family moved to pastures new. The first advert for the next House for Duty priest didn't entice any of the applicants to put their names forward so it has been advertised again. Please keep praying for the right person.

Yes, it's been nearly 8 months (as of now 19 Jan) since Evie was born and she has come along very well since her difficult entry into the world and has enjoyed a few Teddy Church mornings (2nd Friday of the month at Fewston) and her first Christmas.

We can all look back, and many do at the beginning of a year, and reviewing does help (as I've said before) but the important part is how you move on. For some, getting through the day is a challenge, for others it's a new project for the year – like reading a new book every month or learning a new

language. For others it's learning more of what's about them – local history or geography, or who they are – family tree.

Christians should be continuing to know who they are in Christ. This is never ending but will go through peaks and troughs. Whether it's through books (physical or electronic), seasonal or other courses, conferences, retreats and quiet days (to name a few) we can know more about our faith and draw closer to God and know how to help others as well.

One thing that the churches will be improving this year is visiting. It was one of the points on the Parish Profile 2 years ago and one that we're starting to tackle now. Part of this is to improve the communication – letting me know sooner rather than later by having a central point of contact and a nominated person in each community – as well as having some people trained as Parish Visitors. I can't always visit at the right time and other people have the gifts for visiting on behalf of the church as well – all over the place people are keeping an eye on each other, which is the way of the countryside. If people need a visit at home or in hospital or wherever, whether it's a one off or regular, for a chat or home communion I'd like to help somehow. A Parish Priest in the Church of England has the Cure of Souls for that

area – a shepherd with lots of sheep – and I want to be a better shepherd than I have been. I don't want it being said 'has it been that long since you were visited?'

May God's blessing be on you.

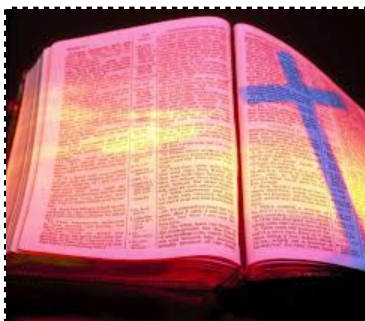

Dear Friends

The months from September to December 2014 have been extremely busy ones for the Circuit Leadership Team. So, I'd like to share with you some of the work we've been involved with.

Stationing

In September 2015, Rev Andrew Atkins will join the Circuit working 50% of his time as airport chaplain at Leeds Bradford Airport and 50% of his time in the Aireborough partnership. Andrew is currently serving in the Leeds North and East Circuit. The Circuit Leadership Team made the brave decision not to rush into stationing to find a minister to replace Fiona. We have decided to wait until the next round of stationing in 2015-16 to allow us to take the time and space to think about how best the Circuit might be staffed and resourced from 2016 onwards.

We are aware that this decision will leave the Aireborough partnership with a reduction in ministerial staffing for 2015-16. But, please be assured that we are currently working hard to address this.

In February 2015, we will be welcoming Brenda Greetham as the new warden/rural missionary based at the Norwood Retreat Centre and Rev Derek Alan, a retired Baptist minister, who will be working part-time at Trinity, Rawdon.

Please do pray for Rev Fiona Spandler as she takes early retirement and seeks God's will as to her next steps. Please pray for Rev Nick Baker and his family as

Nick moves to the Angus, Dundee and Perthshire Circuit in September 2015 to be their Superintendent Minister.

The way forward

As we've worked through the stationing process, our thoughts have also turned as to how best we might work together as a Circuit to fulfil our Circuit Mission Statement. As a Circuit Leadership Team, we have begun a process of discernment with the help of Rev Piers Lane from the Methodist Church's Discipleship, Learning and Ministry Network. As we are committed to enabling the ministry of the whole people of God, we will be asking all of the Circuit churches to share in this process, which will continue until the end of the Connexional year in 2016. We are hopeful that this process will also help us make the right decisions with regard to future staffing of the Circuit.

At the moment, this process is at a very early stage and I will share more with you at Circuit Meeting. It really is a case of "watch this space" as we begin what we believe will be a creative, dynamic and Spirit-filled piece of work, which will enable us to share the good news of Jesus in the towns and villages in which we live and worship.

It looks like 2015 will be a busy year for us all. May it also be a very blessed one for us all.

As has been said before, Open the Book is a very good and easy way of bringing Bible stories into schools and is recognised by the schools, (and OfSTED) as such. The team at Askwith School generally go in on the third Wednesday at about 8.45 am for a quick practise whilst the team for Farnley School take the Collective Worship (Assembly) on the second and fourth Tuesday at about 9.05. They rehearse the half

term's sessions the term before and then run through it on the morning.

The sessions are 10-15 minutes and are enjoyed by the children and teachers – who all join in in different ways each time. Usually we dress up, sometimes it's a straight read of Bob Hartman's story, now and again it's via a Powerpoint presentation but the children always take part.

Walking and praying with Christians of the Middle East from Churches Together in Britain and Ireland

The Christian churches of the Middle East are facing a crisis unparalleled in recent history. As a result of a set of complex religious and political factors, the number of Christians in the region has fallen dramatically as many have sought refuge in other parts of the world, especially the West. However these are ancient communities that trace their origins back to the very beginnings of Christianity. The present conflicts and political instabilities in countries such as Egypt, Iraq, Syria, Lebanon, Israel and the Palestinian Territories have had a profound impact upon these Christian communities. Many Church leaders in the region believe that without a Christian presence, the future of the Middle East looks bleak indeed.

Yet at the same time knowledge in the Western churches of these Christian communities remains minimal and often we are unaware of who Middle Eastern Christians are and what issues they face in today's world. In popular perceptions of the Middle East, Arab equals Muslim and rarely Christian. Our knowledge of our Christian sisters and Brothers in the region is an important

factor in their survival. www.ctbi.org.uk

Lent is a crucial time to remember the lands in which Christianity has its roots - Syria, Lebanon, Egypt, Israel, Palestine and above all Jerusalem are names that remind us of crucial events in the Bible, but also names that dominate our news today.

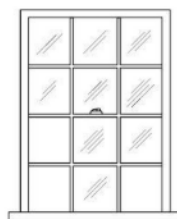

An Ordinary meeting of MWPC was held at Askwith Village Hall on 20 November 2014. Langbar, Nesfield, Denton, Askwith and Weston parishes were all represented. Cllr Fort from NYCC PC Scott from NYCC Police, clerk and members of the public were also in attendance. Items that were discussed included road safety outside Askwith School, Cold Calling zones in Middleton and Denton which should be in place early in 2015. The Clerk had received further quotes for kerbing around Denton grass triangle. It was agreed to pay for a Verge Crossing. Application to NYCC who would then provide a full specification to enable the contractors to confirm quotations before a final decision was made. Cllr Stewart asked if Denton Hall Estates would allow local residents to maintain the Estate's small parcel of land opposite the Denton Grass triangle as this is over grown and unsightly. Clerk to follow this up. Middleton was now without a councillor after the resignation of Susan Missin. Election notices had been posted and a new councillor can be co-opted from late December. All the council's policies

and regulations were updated. Budgets for 2015/16 were discussed with the precept to rise by £30 which is the first increase in 5 years. Under Highway matters the increased traffic over Denton suspension bridge was highlighted with a suggestion of priority arrows posted at each end of the bridge. Accounts were presented and invoices paid. Under planning matters the recent planning application for a footbridge crossing the river Wharfe into Burley was discussed and it was confirmed that the council opposed this. Members of the public were reminded that if they have an opposition to a planning application then they should write with their comments to the planners as this will have just as much impact as any council comments.

The next meeting is 19 February 2015 at Askwith Village Hall starting at 7.45pm.

The Lower Washburn Parish Council met on 8 January. The parish members discussed the budget for 2015/2016 and agreed that the precept would be increased from £6500 to £6750.

There is concern that the current 40 mph speed limit through Leathley may be being abused and we will be asking North Yorkshire County Council to carry out a speed survey in Leathley to see if the current speed limit needs amending.

I am happy to report that crime figures published by NYCC police show that no crimes have been reported in the area of the parish for November and December 2014.

PC Marie Scott (collar number 187) has been appointed to be responsible for our area and can be contacted by dialling 101, press option 2 and asking for her by name or collar number.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be on Thursday 12 March 2015 commencing at 8.00pm in the Leathley Village Hall.

From April North Yorkshire County Council is reducing their grass cutting budget by only cutting grass, on main roads, for safety and visibility rather than aesthetic reasons. If this is deemed not to be sufficient in the valley the Council will consider making further arrangements.

In June there will be two cycle events passing through the Parish. Ilkley Cycling Club hosts the White Rose Classic on Sunday 28 which goes along the B6451 and then on through Blubberhouses. Harrogate Nova CC hosts their road race based around Norwood and Pennypot Lane. To alleviate the impact of car parking on the community the organiser, Dave Morris, has asked for suggestions or help with facilities on the day. 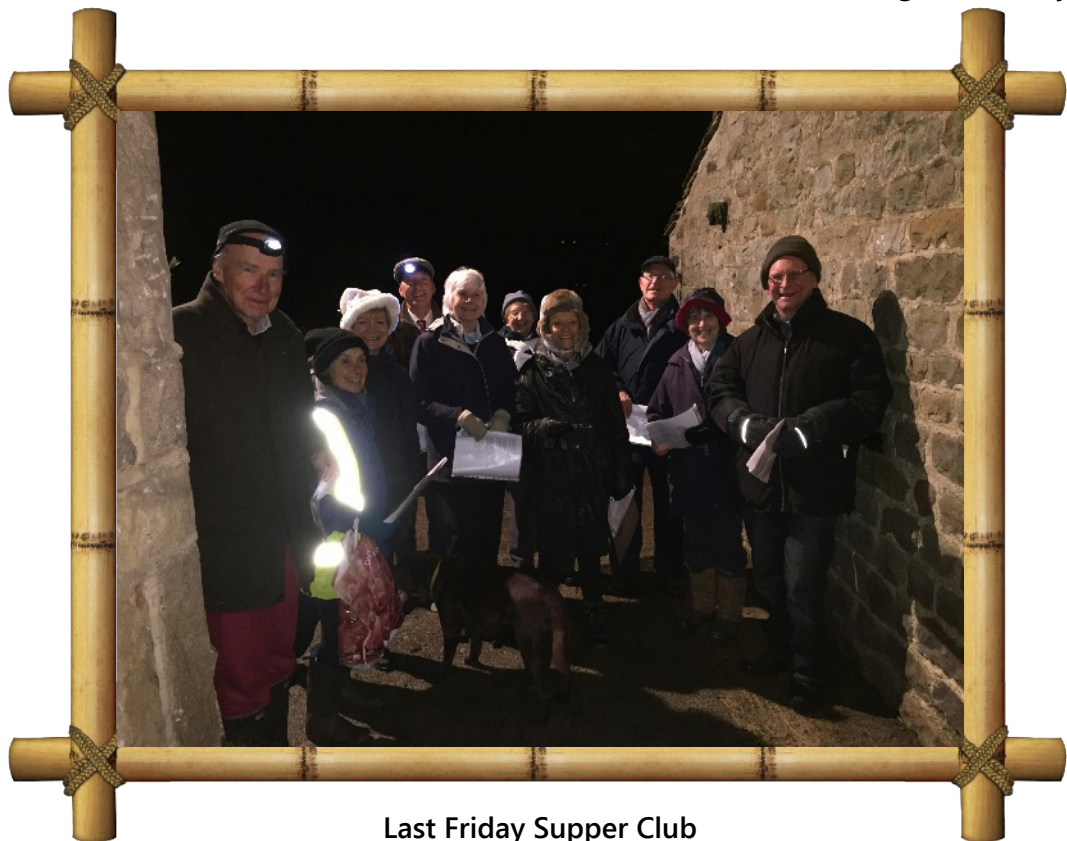
