

Dear Friends,

As Christians, Easter is a time we all look forward to. Easter Day is usually the Sunday when churches have their largest congregations of the year and, as a Presbyter, I especially look forward to leading the Easter Day services in churches full of people celebrating the resurrection of our Jesus.

And yet so many miss out on a big part of Easter.....

If Easter Day service is one of the best attended services of the Christian year then the Good Friday services must be some of the least well supported and attended. This has certainly been my own experience in the Methodist Church for several years and many Methodist and Anglican colleagues confirm the same experience.

Many Christians jump from the celebrations of Palm Sunday, when Jesus rode into Jerusalem seated on a donkey to cries of Hosanna; straight to the celebrations of Easter Day when Jesus rose in triumph from death to glorious, new, transformed resurrection life! They miss out the crucial bit in between.


Those who don't go to church on Good Friday miss out on Jesus' suffering and

death; the sacrifice Jesus made for each and every one of us to set us free from the power of sin and evil and put us into right relationship with God.

Yes, it is perfectly possible to meditate on the Biblical accounts of Good Friday alone, at home; but there is something very powerful about gathering in church and remembering those events together, in singing the wonderful Good Friday hymns like "There is a Green Hill Far Away" and "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross." There is something powerful verv about gathering together to worship God on that day and to corporately offer our thanks and praise for the saving power of the cross!

If you have never been to a church service on Good Friday please do think about going to a Good Friday service this year. I am sure you'll find that if you journey with your sisters and brothers in Christ through the pain and sorrow of Good Friday; you will appreciate even more the celebration and joy of the resurrection on Easter Day as we sing our Easter hymns and share in Holy Communion together!

The Stations of the Cross have formed part of Christian devotion at Passiontide for many centuries because they enable us to engage actively with the path of suffering walked by Jesus. They originated when early Christians visited Jerusalem and wanted to follow literally in the footsteps of Jesus, tracing the path from Pilate's house to Calvary. They would pause for prayer and devotion at various points. Eventually those pilgrims brought the practice back to their home countries and ever since then Christians of differing traditions have used this form of devotion.

In the late fourteenth century the Franciscans were given the responsibility for the holy places of Jerusalem and they erected tableaux to aid the devotion of the visitors. These kinds of images are now commonplace inside churches, and occasionally outside them.

The number of stations has varied immensely through the centuries from as few as five to as many as thirty-six, but the now traditional number of fourteen was established by Clement XII in 1731 – nine scriptural stations and a However, owing to the increasing counterpoint to Easter's ALLELUIAS! ecumenical popularity of this devotion

there have been attempts to create a wholly scriptural set on which to focus.

The recent rediscovery of the unity of the death and resurrection of Jesus has also led to the inclusion of a fifteenth station - the Resurrection, though this may be superseded by the emergence of the 14 Stations of the Resurrection as part of popular devotion (from page 236 Times and Seasons Church House Publishing).

Having followed a cross and stopped at various points on the Via Dolorosa (the way of sorrow) in 1998, Julie and I found it very powerful, despite the sights, sounds and smells as the rest of Jerusalem continued with their trading etc. We will be offering 'The Way of the Cross' as a Good Friday (3 April) devotional from 12 noon at St Oswald's. Leathley using readings, music, silence, prayer and paintings by Sieger Koder, (German soldier in WW2, then artist and Catholic Priest). "In 2014, Singing the Faith went to the Oscars. We took a look at four of that year's multi-award nominated films and asked how the words of certain hymns may pick up on their themes and develop them from a Christian point of view. That admittedly unusual approach to film-viewing was well-received – so we've done it again.

It has to be said that Wes Anderson's wonderfully quirky The Grand Hotel Budapest, which picked up nine nominations, floored us. You may have some ideas though – if so, let us know. However, other films on the nominations list have offered up themes that hymn writers too have tackled, sometimes from quite contrary points of view. Where films such as Interstellar and Wild challenge us to think about our beliefs and to find words with which to respond, our "sung theology" can be a helpful place to start.

The Bishop of Worcester has launched the 2015 series of St Wilfrid Lectures with a plea for churches to remain open throughout the week and be flexible, as signs of the Christian faith and places of both worship and community service.

In a wide ranging talk (on Thu Feb 26) called 'The Rural Church in Place', Bishop John Inge, who has a longstanding interest in rural affairs, told the Cathedral audience that churches were a vital part of national spiritual life.

"Christian churches are absolutely crucial to the scheme of things" he said. "Their very existence is, literally, significant. If the heavens declare the glory of God as the psalmist says, then our skyline of our country is dotted with the towers and spires of our churches which point heavenwards to the witness to the fact that this world is not a 'system closed to itself'."

The Bishop added, "If the majority of our churches were to be closed the message sent out to our society would be a disastrous one as far as the Gospel is concerned. It would be to suggest that the Christian faith had had its day."

With 16,000 Church of England churches needing continual upkeep, Bishop Inge addressed the challenges facing those with responsibility for churches and he advocated the need for open churches, serving the community, flexible in their use.

"Part of the answer must lie in being more flexible with our buildings," said Bishop Inge. "That is a theological as well as a practical point. The trouble is that we have gone wrong sometimes by forgetting that both parts of our Lords 'summary of the law' have repercussions for churches just as they do for disciples. "The first purpose of churches as with

"The first purpose of churches, as with human beings, is to worship God... but when it comes to the second, 'loving our neighbour', which I would suggest should apply to churches as well as to people, churches do rather less well. Churches should be vibrant centres of service to our community and the record always there is not SO Traditionally our rural parish churches were at the heart of the community in which they stand in both a human and geographical sense. The trouble is that over the years a pietism has crept in which has excluded all activities apart from worship from them, all other activities being transferred to other places."

He added, "Far too many churches still remain locked and stand like mausoleums except when open for worship making them almost completely marginal to the communities they are intended to serve."

Bishop Inge gave examples of imaginative use for churches which he said "had breathed new life into them". He concluded, "My hope and my prayer is that our churches might truly embody our faith... and so help our country to recover its spiritual moorings by embodying a real and deep commitment to God and to neighbour".

GATHERING IN MAY

We all had one: many of us still have. A mother. 100% essential to life for humans (and to most animals also). Someone did it for us or we would not be here; not only giving birth but also care afterwards. For years. Mother's Day in March was a special chance to say "Thank you".

I promised last month to tell you about two women in Ethiopia, Adi and Loko. Good mothers both, with many children to support. For Adi, help arrived from Christian Aid's partner, HUNDEE. That help has transformed life for her and her children. Loko's life is still very hard. Hopefully, help can reach her soon with funds from this year's Christian Aid Week.

Adi is a widow 46 years old with 8 children. When she was widowed her community sidelined her and she struggled to feed her family. didn't have what counts - farm animals. So Christian Aid's local partner gave her a cow and two goats. All change! As well as being able to feed her family and having an income, she has status in her community. Now, people listen to her. She has joined others to campaign against the destructive local custom of child marriage for girls. Adi has choices and hope for the future. The cow made all the difference!

Loko is 28, also with 8 children.

Married, but with no help from her husband. Afraid, alone and in pain, four times a week she makes a backbreaking trip to gather firewood to sell. Big thorns scratch her legs and pierce her plastic shoes. Adding to her fear, hyenas could attack her in the bush. But she has no choice: "If I can't collect firewood my children will die". As it is, the family eats only once a day. A small loan, as little as £5 to us, could enable her to set up a simple business and free her from her desperate and

With Loko's situation now well known. I'm sure she will get help. But she is just one of many in dire straits. And you and I can make the world of difference in Christian Aid Week. Christian Aid Week is 10-16 May this



We read with great interest David Swallow's excellent article in the February Magazine about the papers found behind the old notice board in the porch at St Oswald's Leathley and we have a little more information about Sir George Martin and Kenneth Crawford.

As boys just before the first world war, they used to come out from Leeds with friends and camp at a cottage in Leathley, which goes a long way to explain why in 1952 they presented the bible to Leathley Church. The cottage became known as Campers' Cottage and later Campus Cottage. The shed they used is still in the garden and the bunk beds on which they slept are still in the shed over a hundred years later. In those days to cycle into the country from Leeds to camp would have been quite an adventure for them.

After the first world war Kenneth Crawford became a respected Leeds dentist and George Martin a successful businessman, later founding the Sir George Martin Charitable Trust, now a very substantial donor to worthy Yorkshire causes. Kenneth Crawford's son Michael, a chartered accountant among other things, became Chairman

of Yorkshire County Cricket Club in the troubled early 1980's.

Here day comes our present involvement. Marcia's brother- in- law is a trustee of the Sir George Martin Trust. He and I were partners with Michael Crawford and others in John Gordon Harrison Taylor in Leeds. By chance a few days after reading the article, he and I and our wives entertained Michael Crawford's widow to lunch. We showed her the article. She confirmed that her father -in- law and George Martin used to camp in Leathley over a hundred years ago.


One way you can pass the good news on is to send Easter cards. You could make some of these easy Easter egg cards (the egg is a symbol of new life so that's why we have eggs at Easter). You will need

- a strip of thin card about 10cm by 30cm
- another piece of coloured card for the egg about 9cm by 12cm
- · felt tip pens
- a ruler, scissors and a glue stick.



Fold the long strip of card in half and then each half back on itself to make a W shape.

Draw an egg shape on the coloured card and cut round it. Cut the egg in half with a jagged edge and stick it onto the folded card as shown. Decorate it and write your message inside - you could even draw a fluffy yellow chick inside the egg.

### **Cock Pit Farm Tea Rooms**

We had a quiz night on Friday 6 March which raised £300 for the Alzheimer's Society, our 2015 charity.

Also we announce our 2nd Annual Dog Show on Bank Holiday Monday 25 May at Cock Pit Farm Tea Rooms. 12 til 3 pm. Fun and games for all the family. Refreshments, stalls etc. Everyone welcome.

Washburn Parish Council met on Monday 2 March at Norwood Social Hall. It has been a relatively quiet period with a few planning applications and little correspondence. There were no crimes committed in the area in January and just two minor ones in February.

The main issue causing concern in the district is the surface of some of our roads. While many potholes have been repaired others are still requiring attention. Blocked drains and full ditches are causing surface water to collect and in some cases freeze. This can cause dangerous road conditions. These concerns have been raised with highways although landowners are responsible for the state of ditches and drains on land adjacent to their properties.





At our March meeting we welcomed Kirsty Christmas from the Leeds Donkey Sanctuary based at Eccup, near Leeds. The first sanctuary in the UK was founded by Dr Elisabeth Svendsen in 1969 to support abused, neglected, and abandoned donkeys everywhere. The movement soon spread and it is now an international animal welfare charity with seven centres throughout the UK and many overseas project teams helping donkeys in other countries.

In the UK they've become involved in donkey assisted therapy for local schoolchildren with additional needs. and members of the public can also adopt a donkey at one of the UK centres. Donkeys are willing and hard working animals which means that they are often almost worked to death by their owners, and then frequently abandoned when they're unable to work anymore, and the charity exists to find and help these creatures wherever they are in the world. They never turn away from a donkey in need and rely entirely on fundraising and volunteers to keep their centres open and carry on their important work. Kirsty gave a very enlightening talk and we were all

moved by her passion for these gentle animals.

2015 is the WI's Centenary year and we're celebrating in style with a Buckingham Palace garden party, Ladies Day at Ripon Races, a Centenary craft exhibition at Kiplin Hall in North Yorkshire, and a Centenary lunch on WI Day with guest speaker Janet Street-Porter at Swinton Park near Masham.
