

As Residentiary and Senior Canon, I serve on the Chapter which is the Governing Body of the Cathedral working with Dean John and my fellow Canons, ordained and lay, in looking after all aspects of the life, worship and mission of this great and ancient Mother Church which houses the seat – cathedra in Greek - of our Bishop Nicholas. In the new Diocese, we work closely with our sister Cathedrals of Bradford and Wakefield in building up God's kingdom and proclaiming the good news of the Risen Ascended Lord, serving this huge area of West Yorkshire and the Dales and almost three million people. It is an enormous privilege and responsibility but also a daily joy and delight to be here. We love welcoming our Diocesan brothers and sisters to this beautiful and holy place, to share its treasures, history, heritage and holiness and to worship with us the one in whose name the place is dedicated.

My particular role is to look after the Cathedral's music and liturgy and pilgrimage. The title Precentor is Latin for first singer. I sing first in choral services and give the choir their note. If they go wrong – hardly if ever! - my job is the give the correct note and set them right again. If I go wrong, that is their job!! I look after all those who provide music and liturgy for this wonderful place including servers and bellringers, readers and intercessors, vergers. It falls to me to oversee all the rotas with hundreds of people involved offering their God-given gifts. This involves training and encouraging new people to have a go so that everyone does something rather than a tiny few doing everything.

For 14 centuries the good news of the Easter message has resounded from this place and almost every day, music has been involved. Our music and liturgy really bring the building alive. The very stones ring out! Ripon people through the ages have filled this holy house with song. Young and old have lifted up a song of praise to God and still do so today. As we proclaim the truth that Jesus is alive, we join our voices with the Celtic monks, Benedictines, Augustinian Canons and Deans and Chapters through the years who have made this place their home. Each group has encouraged local people including many children to make music to lift our hearts and lives to God and open us to his working among us. Music touches and inspires us in a very powerful way – it is a gift of God which we offer back to him in thanksgiving and love.

The first Song School (on the site of the Cathedral Hall) was flourishing back in the 7th century when St Wilfrid brought singers from St Peter's in Rome to teach the chant. The first Precentor Eddius Stephanus also known as Eddi of Ripon was a monk who looked after all the music and services, training and nurturing the choristers and clerks. Some of the tunes and certainly most of the words we use here in the 21st century would be familiar to them and they would feel perfectly at home in our services. They would probably be deeply impressed that the great work begun here in Saxon times is still continued. It is an awesome thought that there is an unbroken chain of Christian worship and witness dating back all those years and it is a daily privilege and joy to be part of that offering of praise in our own generation.

A special heartfelt thanks goes to all who sing and make music day by day in this wonderful and holy place – to Mr Andrew Bryden, our Director of Music; Mr Tim Harper, Assistant Director of Music Organist and Mr Matt Lennox, Voice Coach for their huge commitment and dedication in ensuring that music of the highest quality is offered; to our Lay Clerks and to our boy and girl choristers for bringing their talents and enthusiasm to enrich our life and worship so beautifully and to our chorister parents for all their support. The music foundation is a wonderful family and each member brings their own unique contribution. We extend our warmest invitation to you to share our life and work for God today and in the future.

Here is a prayer to use as we give thanks to God for music and worship and the glimpse of heaven they give to us.

God of glory,

around whose throne all the heavenly powers offer you ceaseless songs of praise:

grant that we may overhear these songs, and with our own lips and lives interpret them

to all in whose presence we play or sing;

That your Church may behold the beauty of its King,

and see with mortal eyes the land that is afar off,

where all your promises are celebrated, and where all your love in every sight and sound

is the theme of eternal rejoicing: through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen Mid Week Communion

10 Letter from Rev Graham Shield

Looking out of my study windows I see a lot of green – leaves on the trees and the hedges, nettles, brambles and grass. Wonderful signs of the new growth of Spring. The study walls are light green, the shepherd's coat in a painting is dark green and this month's photos on the two nature calendars have a green background.

The green on my desk is the front cover of May's Parish Mag with its lovely depiction of the Trinity via an intricate Celtic knot – go and find it and remind yourself how everything is interlinked – people, creation, God. Trinity Sunday follows on from Pentecost (50 days from Easter) and Ascension (40 days after Easter). The church colours move from the celebratory white and gold of Easter-tide, through the red flames of Pentecost to the long season of green.

In farming terms, the cows and calves, ewes and lambs, are out of their over wintering sheds, poly tunnels and cubicles and into the verdant pastures. Whether it's farming or gardening it's the growing season – and always dependent on the weather.

In the Church year, we're encouraged to grow all the time, using the various seasons to focus on particular aspects of the faith. The New Testament Gospel readings after Easter focus on Jesus' resurrection appearances, His teaching about when He has ascended back to His Father and then the descent of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. There are also the various stories of how the Disciples reacted and how they continued to spread the Good News of Jesus.

Some see Pentecost as the birthday of the Church when 'about three thousand were added to their number' (Acts 2:41). In the previous chapter a few days before Pentecost, Peter spoke to 'a group numbering about 120' believers. The number of believers grew enormously as they ventured out of Jerusalem, Judea and Samaria. When the Temple was destroyed in AD 76, followed by persecution, many fled abroad.

This period of early church growth is at a similar time to our period of growth and greening. It's a time of various Christian Conferences, locally and nationally, helping those who camp or caravan, use Butlin's chalets or go residential, to learn more about their faith over a weekend or a week. Julie and I would highly recommend this.

We are being encouraged to 'Grow the Kingdom' – which is encouraging others to become followers of Christ with us, as well as deepening our own faith.

Rather than being an annual that comes and goes, or a perennial that keeps on doing the same thing, let's be evergreen shrubs that have something to show all year round but also have times of interest (flowers or berries). I've just ordered 6 dwarf evergreen shrubs for the patio pots. Hopefully this will keep them out of the way of the rabbits as well as providing something to look at all year. (For those who are interested – Choisya, 2 different Euonymus, a lilac Ceanothus, scarlett Leucothoe and rubella Skimmia.) To attracts bees and butterflies there'll soon be 3 patio Buddleja Buzz plants as well.

I pray that in this green season of growth and Trinity that somehow you'll put a spurt on, branches and leaves will grow towards the sun and the light or the Son and His light, and you learn more about yourself, your community, your faith.

SERVICE CHANGES

Over the last two years there have been a few changes to some services as I've responded to a particular situation. However, the monthly pattern has remained over a month but the order of services has changed. Two more changes are happening this month.

Firstly, Farnley PCC decided, after discussion at the Annual meeting, not to continue with the alternate third Sunday Evening Prayer due to very low numbers over the past year. Leathley PCC is considering the same for their fourth Sunday Evening Prayer. Generally there are two or three – organist, reader and leader. This gives us an opportunity to look at other sorts of evening services, probably less frequently. Secondly, Fewston's Family Service hasn't regularly had young children for quite some time so they've decided for the moment to have Morning Prayer on the third Sunday as well as the second (which replaced the Songs of Praise/Musical afternoon time). The second Sunday MP will be from the Book of Common Prayer and the third Sunday will be from Common Worship. *Graham*



Some items of interest from Lower Washburn Parish Council

Mr J. Smith (Leathley) was elected Chair and Mr Houseman (Lindley) was elected as Vice-Chair for the forthcoming year. Mr Smith thanked the previous chair person Mrs Fowler for the work she had carried out during 2014/2015.

Our parish caretaker, Mr Walsh, continues to carry out valuable work in the parish (e.g. cutting back overgrowth to improve sight lines, clearing dykes and pipes to try and alleviate flooding, fitting and repairing stiles and dog gates on public footpaths, repairing potholes). During 2014 he built and installed public benches at Castley, Stainburn and Lindley. If there is any work that you feel needs carrying out please contact the parish clerk, Mr Elam, on 01943 864312.

The parish had kerbing put on the corners of the small triangle of land just below Leathley village green which divides the two roads in the hope that vehicles might be deterred from driving over it and eroding the edges.

Washburn Parish Council report

This month was the annual Parish meeting of the Washburn Parish Council. The Chairman gave a report on the work carried out by the Parish Council; in particular the lighting for the outside of Fewston Church. The Parish is benefiting from the maintenance skills of our caretaker in keeping the valley safer and tidier. The repair of small potholes on our minor roads has improved the situation for some but the Parish Council is unable to repair major faults in road surfaces and pot holes over long lengths of roads.

One of the main roles of the Council is the liaison with various departments of Harrogate Borough council and North Yorkshire County Council. We have a responsibility to report highway problems i.e. road repairs, blocked ditches and culverts. We comment on building plans and developments, and try to find solutions to concerns brought to our attention by electors of the Parish. However no members of the Parish attended the Annual Meeting. Is this due to lethargy or the lack of any concerns or complete customer satisfaction? At the recent national election there was apparently a turnout of over 60%. We need the public to get more involved with their Parish Council. Members of the public are invited to attend any Parish meeting, the next one is in July. In May 2016 elections will be held for Parish councillors, why not give it a go?

As many of you know my partner Stuart was involved in a vehicle IED in Afghanistan back at the end of 2012, and following that went through extensive rehab. He unfortunately was then involved in a second accident in 2014, which through factors that were out of his control led to the below knee amputation of his right leg.

BLESMA is a charity that supports all veterans who have lost limbs whilst serving in the British Army, and have

started being involved with Stu recently hence the reason for initially supporting them.

FISHER HOUSE is a charity funded home located on the hospital site at Birmingham, which provides accommodation and support to families of individuals in the Army, who for whatever reasons have ended up in hospital. Stu spent a significant time last summer in hospital in Birmingham, so Fisher House provided us a home away from home during what was a fairly daunting emotional and experience.

Both charities are amazing causes that have had a very personal impact on both of us the last 10 months, it is only thanks to you and my other friends and family that I can now give a little back to them in return, so thank you again.

We had a very entertaining talk from Maria Glot who is very involved with the Saltaire World Heritage Site and conducts tours and guided walks around Saltaire village. Sir Titus Salt, (20 Sept 1803 – 29 Dec 1896) born in Morley, near Leeds, he was one of 9 children and was manufacturer. politician and а philanthropist in Bradford. He was best known for having built Salts Mill, a large textile mill, together with the attached village of Saltaire. He originally wanted to be a doctor, but after catching sight of his own blood decided medicine was not for him. In 1833 he took over his father's business and within 20 years had expanded it to be the largest employer in Bradford. In 1836 Salt came upon some bales of Alpaca wool in a warehouse in Liverpool and, after taking some samples away to experiment, came back and bought the consignment, eventually making it into cloth. Smoke and pollution emanated from mills and Salt factory chimneys and tried unsuccessfully to clean up the pollution. He eventually decided to build a mill large enough to consolidate his textile manufacture in one place, but did not like to be a party to increasing that already overcrowded borough and therefore bought land three miles from the town in Shipley next to the River Aire, the Leeds and Liverpool Canal and the Midland Railway and began building in He opened Saltaire Mills (now 1851. known as Salt's mill) with a grand banquet on his 50th birthday. He built

houses, bathhouses, an institute, hospital almshouses and churches which has now made up Saltaire village. Although he provided work for very many people, he was a very hard taskmaster and expected his 'pound of flesh' from all his workforce, children aged 10,9,8,7 and 6 all worked in the mill and in very poor conditions. Salt destroyed all his paperwork eventually as he didn't want people to know just how ruthless he was, but he did provide employment for 50 years. Saltaire village has streets named after various people including his family, eq Caroline Street is named after his wife and all the signs are being changed back to the original blue ones instead of black The village has a very and white. interesting Visitor Centre which is well worth a visit, and a statute of Sir Titus Salt is in place in Roberts Park. Maria gave all the WI members a book mark depicting the women who were living and working in the mill here is one example:

Mary Pearson 1861, Aged 44 Married, born in Addingham. Lives at 12 William Henry Street, with her husband and two daughters and a boarder. She is well off, her husband is an overlooker.

Our next meeting is on Thursday 11 June at 7.30pm at Askwith Village Hall when we welcome Peter Higginbotham who'll be giving a talk on Local Workhouses.
