

What did the Romans do for us?

The original Roman year had 10 months beginning with *Martius* "March". This was added to by Numa Pompilius, the second king of Rome circa 700 BC. He put *Januarius* and *Februarius* before March. He also changed the number of days in several months to end on an odd one, a lucky number. There was sometimes an extra *Intercalaris* "intercalendar" month after *Februarius* This is the origin of the leap-year day being in February.

In 46 BC, Julius Caesar reformed the Roman calendar (hence the Julian calendar) changing the number of days in many months and therefore removing the need for *Intercalaris*. The seventh month had been the fifth month, *Quintillis*, so he named it after himself – hence July. Later *Sextillis* (month 6 now month 8) was renamed by Augustus Ceasar. The rest of the months retained their original names – September (for seven) but now the ninth month.

Other interesting (?) July facts are that July starts on the same day of the week as April in every year, and January in leap years. In a common year no other How does your July look? Busy, busy? It's good (vital) to plan ahead. It's good to have a mix of activities so that it isn't all meetings and services. We all need time out for reflection and relaxing (although can a Vicar [and wife] relax properly whilst in the parish, with or without the dog collar?).

The Sabbath used to be the day of rest, Saturday for the Jews and Sunday for the Christians (because it was the day on which Jesus died after the Romans crucified him), but gradually our society (in the name of progress) has eroded that - but we should try and build in a Sabbath day to our week, whatever day it actually is, for our own benefit and for those that we live and work with, regardless of whether we worship God.

Sextillis has 5 Sundays which means that there is only one service across Church and Chapel at the end of next month. It's another opportunity to worship together as the People of God in the Valleys – this time at St Helen's, Denton.

As I've asked Revd Fiona Jenkins (who's with us for a few months) to organise the service, I might have the morning off – and then go to Blubberhouses cricket ground for the match of the season! (I'll try not to bowl out a Churchwarden this time!)

May you be able to work, rest and play this month – with or without a Mars bar.



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TAKING & GIVING


If you look at a map of Israel you will see that there are two small inland seas. And if you look closely you will see that these two seas are linked by the River Jordan. Members of the public are invited to attend any Parish meeting, the next one is in July. In May 2016 elections will be held for Parish councillors, why not give it a go?

Mid Wharfedale Parish Council ~ midwharfedaleparishcouncil.btck.co.uk The Parish, Annual and Ordinary meeting of MWPC was held at Askwith Village Hall on 21st May 2015. The parishes of Nesfield with Langbar, Denton, Askwith and Weston were all represented along with Harrogate County Councillor John Fort. Cllr White of Denton and Cllr Crossley of Weston were both voted on again as Chairman and Vice Chairman. Amongst items discussed during the meeting was the confirmation that Middleton and Denton now have Cold Calling Zones set up and that CIIr Petty will investigate setting up a Cold Calling Zone in Askwith. The village seat in Askwith is to be painted and varnished. Maximum wagon weights in Denton are to be investigated by Cllr Fort. The registration of village greens in Denton, Askwith and Weston are to be investigated under new legislation, Schedule 3 of the Commons Act. The new Transparency Requirement Regulations 2015/494 came into effect on 1 April 2015. The Council will comply with these within the required time scale via the MWPC website. Under highway matters the Clerk agreed to follow up various issues including the road collapsing near the bridge on West Road Askwith, the lack of white lines in Denton and Middleton and a sunken manhole at Mill Dam Beck Weston. Councillors were provided with the internal audited accounts along with the internal auditors report for the 2014/2015 year, it was resolved to accept these. The Annual governance statement was then approved by the council. Accounts for the period February to May were presented and planning issues discussed. The next meeting is 27 August 2015 at Askwith Village Hall starting at 7.45pm.

They all agreed to carry on serving for another 12 months but it was agreed that at the next AGM they would like to stand down. The village hall committee desperately needs new members to bring some new ideas and enthusiasm to the meetings. The village hall plays a vital role in our small community. Everyone on the committee works extremely hard. To ensure it continues to thrive we need more people from the community willing to help. Our fun dog show was held on May 25th here at Cock Pit Farm. We have now raised over £1500 in total and are so thrilled. Thanks to everyone who supported us as ever. Thanks to my staff and friends who always help out at these events. We had a cool but enjoyable day with 91 dogs attending. Money raised goes to our 2015 charity, The Alzheimer's society.

Our Speaker for the June meeting was Mr Peter Higginbotham who has done quite extensive research into the Workhouses for the poor. He became interested as he found out that an Aunt had unfortunately died in one of the them. People had to be in a pretty desperate state to work in the Workhouses. Men. women and children were segregated -23 females 10 boys, 3 girls, 4 80 year olds, 7 above 60, starting at 6 am mostly working for 10 hours per day. They were reasonably well fed with bread and gruel, the gruel consisted of 2 ozs of oatmeal, half a teaspoonful of treacle, salt and water. The sea pie was very popular and consisted of meat and vegetables, but was called Sea Pie because it was popular with the sailors. Peter showed us some photographs of rows and rows of men women and children sat eating their gruel (and on occasions meat), with their statutory uniforms which were blue and white cotton uniforms and hats. women did mostly cleaning, laundry work and cooking whilst the men were stone breaking, gardening and chopping wood. The Workhouse was the worst place to get ill, cramped poor conditions, no-one could read and write and most of the time people were drunk, which was alcohol based, often the medication was sold by the patients for food. The stigma never left anyone having worked in the Workhouses and once they did leave they would never talk about their time there.

Skipton had a fine Workhouse, which is now flats, Pateley Bridge Workhouse is now Nidderdale Museum and the part of St. James' Hospital which was a Workhouse is now the new Medical Museum. Peter has also written quite a few interesting books about the Workhouses plus one on Recipes during that time. We were given a a very interesting and informative talk and were all thankful not to have been living during those times.

As this is the WI Centenary year we had a special event during May '100 Shades of Green', a celebration of our most talented members from across the whole of the Northern Federation of Tyne and Wear, Cumbria, Westmorland, Northumberland and North Yorkshire. It was held in May in the beautiful surroundings of Kiplin Hall near Richmond and about twenty of our members went to see it. Featuring the most exquisite embroidery, patchwork, jewellery, knitting, crocheting, lace making, weaving, paintings, flower arrangements, the list went on and on. It was quite the most incredible collection of talent and almost overwhelming in its quality. As a complete contrast we eventually moved on for lunch to Thorp Perrow Arboretum and spent a lovely afternoon wandering amongst the spring blossom and enjoying the tranquility of the woodland. All in all a perfect day.




