

As I look out of my study window...across my garden...and out towards the Chevin, I am struck by the "greenness" of my surroundings. I am struck by the many shades of green in the grass, the plants and the trees. I can see a real abundance of green...with colour coming from the roses and bedding plants in the garden. All a result of warm weather and rain!

I am blessed with a view of "all things bright and beautiful". Nature in all of its wonderful abundance.

As I think of the word "abundance", I am drawn to the story of Jesus and the Samaritan woman, as told in John 4. It's a story we know well: a story of a Samaritan woman encountering Jesus at the well. Her encounter with Jesus changed her life. During their time together, as she draws water for him, Jesus makes this promise:



"Everyone who drinks this water will be thirsty again, but whoever drinks the water I give them will never thirst. Indeed, the water I give them will become in them a spring of water welling up to eternal life." An image of the never-failing and abundant love of Christ. For Jesus came that we might have life; life in all its' abundance.

And that promise is echoed in the words of St Paul in Ephesians 3, as he prays for the people of Ephesus. It's a prayer prayed for all us as well. From Ephesians 3 v. 16-19, these are Paul's words: "I pray that out of his glorious riches he may strengthen you with power through his Spirit in your inner being, so that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith. And I pray that you, being rooted and established in love, may have power, together with all the Lord's holy people, to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ, and to know this love that surpasses knowledge – that you may be filled to the measure of all the fullness of God."

So, as you wonder at the abundance of the natural world this summer, may it remind you of the abundant life which Jesus promises.



Ourresponses on the resolutions at the AGM was discussed and Lesley would inform our area delegate of results.

Paula spoke of the inaugural WI walk on 2 June – 4 members had an enjoyable walk to Otley concluding with coffee and scones. The next walk will be at Harewood led by Caroline Barker and Anne Thorpe, Paula being away, starting at the Muddy Boots cafe.

Anne Thorpe had used her bursary award to go to The Himalayan gardens day with the NYW group and recommended everyone should see it. The knitted heart blankets have been given to the Guide dogs by Pat Brown.

We welcomed Dave Jones Community Defibrillation Office to the meeting. We had an informative and 'entertaining' awareness talk on attending someone who has collapsed, on first aid that can be given and defibrillators, he highlighted what a difference having a defibrillator available can have if someone has had a cardiac arrest. The only way to access one is through a 999 call, the operator will assess your situation and if appropriate give you the access code for the box and inform you of the nearest one in your area. The equipment 'talks' to you and tells you what to do. As the name suggests they only give a shock if patient is in either ventricular or tachycardic fibrillation, this is diagnosed by the equipment. Having to use one seems not quite as daunting as it did prior to the talk.

One very important point to remember is if someone collapses and you go to their aid always check first if it is safe for yourself to help , never put yourself in danger.

Elections were held on 5th May with all MWPC councilors standing unopposed. The council is currently made up of the following councillors. Nesfield/Langbar Susan Ellis, Kathryn Chivers. Middleton, Chris Bloor. Denton, Alison White, Heather Stewart. Askwith, Frankie Petty, Martin Whitley. Weston, Francis Caton, Jane Crossley. The parish still has vacancies for two councillors, one for Nesfield/Langbar and one at Askwith, so if you would like to volunteer to put something back into the community by attending four council meetings a year, where you can express the views of your parish and also have input on local planning issues, then please contact the clerk as below. The Parish, Annual and Ordinary meeting of MWPC was held at Askwith Village Hall on 19th May 2016.

All parishes were represented. Cllr White of Denton and Cllr Crossley of Weston were both voted on as Chairman and Vice Chairman. The accounts for 2015/16 were presented. It was resolved to accept the Annual Governance Statement. An internal audit had been undertaken and as there were no issues from this the accounts were adopted. Highway matters were discussed and under planning issues, the granted planning permission to increase production of Biomass production at Holme Farm via Denton Estates was discussed. This planning permission has been granted with various conditions including works and tarmac surfacing of two lay-bys on the Denton road, and a traffic survey to be completed. The Clerk is to ask for further information on these items. Deliveries to and from the Biomass plant must only go along the Denton to Ilkley road and must not pass through Askwith, with deliveries only allowed between 8.30am to 5.00pm Monday to Friday. Planning permission for Disabled access and toilets has been granted at St Helen's church Denton.

${f A}$ ll in the month of JULY

It was:

150 years ago: on 28th July 1866 that Beatrix Potter was born. This children's writer and illustrator created enduring animal characters including Peter Rabbit, Squirrel Nutkin, Mrs Tiggy-Winkle and Jemima Puddle-Duck.

100 years ago: from 1st July to 18th November 1916 that the WW1's Battle of the Somme took place. The slaughter was epic, the result inconclusive. It was the first battle to use tanks.

70 years ago: on 21st July 1946 that bread and flour rationing were introduced in Britain as the country's wheat crop had been ruined by continual rain.

Also 70 years ago: on 22nd July 1946 that the King David Hotel in Jerusalem was bombed by a militant right-wing group. It was the British admin HQ for Palestine. 91 people died.

60 years ago: on 2nd July 1956 that Elvis Presley recorded the song Hound Dog. Critics nicknamed him 'Elvis the Pelvis'.

50 years ago: on 30th July 1966 that the 1966 FIFA World Cup final was played in London. England beat Germany 4-2. (This remains England's only World Cup win.)

40 years ago:- on 4th July 1976 that Operation Entebbe took place when Israeli commandos staged a counter-terrorist hostage-rescue mission at Entebbe Airport in Uganda following the hijacking of an Air France plane a week earlier.

Also 40 years ago: on 18th July 1976 that Romanian gymnast Nadia Comaneci, aged 14, became the first female to score a perfect 10 in an Olympic gymnastic event.


