RITA SWALLOW
10.11.35 TO 10.9.16

"The family of Rita Swallow, who died with tragic suddenness in September, would like to thank everyone from far and wide for their thoughts, cards, letters and much appreciated food at a very difficult time.

So many good things were said about someone described variously as a "smasher" and "one of the best" and the presence of so many at the funeral in St Oswald's was a further indication of the love in which she was held"

Rita lived in Otley from an early age and was to play a significant part in the life of the town. She excelled at Prince Henry's Grammar School, winning prizes and chose to join Atkinson, Dacre & Slack. She eventually became Managing Clerk of the firm, making a host of friends amongst clients.

As a girl Rita began voluntary service which marked her as a very special person, collecting for National Savings and went on to hold many offices at Otley Methodist Church where she helped found the Tuesday Club which provided opportunity for working women to meet. She became Secretary of the town's Council for Churches, an ecumenical mix, at the time when it was decided to put a Cross on the Chevin at Easter.

After her marriage to David, the second for both of them, she had an instant family in Barbara and Kathryn, later followed by two sets of twins, developing a special bond with them.

On moving to Leathley Rita became involved with St Oswald's Church as a PCC member and organiser of fund-raising events like Sunday afternoon teas, the one-off Leathley Feast and Open Gardens. She was involved in the Bible Fellowship begun by Canon Peter Winstone and introduced coffee after morning service. Rita was also part of the Open the Book team which went into Farnley School for assemblies enacting bible stories, sometimes with the children's help. Rita also made local history when she became the first female church warden of St Oswald's Church in April 2015, joining Terry Bramall for his second year. She and Terry worked well together and they accomplished much. She had taken on the various rotas the previous



year so that everything worked more smoothly and this year alone had co-ordinated two Open Garden events and the wonderful Flower Festival at the August Bank Holiday weekend. With the increase in weddings at Leathley, six this year, Rita decided that she would help the couples by making herself available for them to contact her with any queries they might have to ensure the smooth running of their special day which was greatly appreciated.

At Deanery level Rita was on a standing committee and later was an ex-officio member of Synod. She also served on the Bradford Diocesan Synod and was a member from 2003 of the Diocesan Pastoral and Property Committee, work she much enjoyed.

Rita and David had a much loved link in the USA with the Diocese of Southwestern Virginia, starting in 1994 at the behest of Reverend Peter Winstone and made many visits leading to lasting friendships. On their visits they took an active part in parish life, spoke to schools about England, to Rotary and generally flew the flag for England.

Rita was very passionate about the WI, its work and values and was President for four years. She held various positions at the North Yorkshire West Federation of WI's including joint Vice-Chairman of the Executive Committee. She was also the main link between the WI and the making of the film Calendar Girls and was given a rosebush called 'Fond Memories' as a gift afterwards.

Many organizations benefited from Rita's involvement including being Chairman of the Otley Ladies' Lifeboat Guild where she was particularly gratified to receive their Silver Badge having helped to raise thousands of pounds over the years. She had a strong involvement with Otley Little Theatre encouraging young people through the Green Room and also with Weeton and Huby Players. David has remarked that he and the family had found Rita's funeral service both moving and comforting, as did about 250 others, and he is feeling overwhelmed at times with people's condolences. The collection at the funeral raised £487 each for St Oswald's Church and Cancer Research.

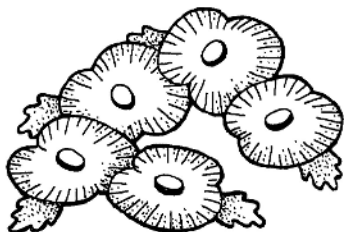

FREE DAFFODIL BULBS

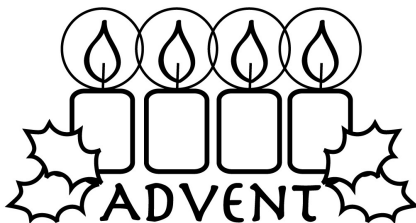
Mid Wharfedale Parish Council

BIG FUNDRAISING NIGHT FOR MENTAL HEALTH
CHARITY MIND,
ORGANISED BY LAURA SANT (THE EDITORS WIFE)

A fundraising evening for mental health charity MIND will be held in Ilkley next month.

The event takes place at the Audley Clevedon retirement home, in Ben Rhydding, from 6pm to 10pm on Saturday, November 19.

It will feature stalls from a number of businesses including Maybimoo Papercut Art, Scents by Sophie The Matty Tree and Phoenix Cards, along with a prize raffle and mass balloon release.

MIND is a charity close to organiser and Ilkley resident Laura Sant's heart, as she developed extreme anxiety after having her first child and also suffers from depression.,

Laura, whose ow business Fake Bake Beauty at Home will also feature on the night, said: "I decided to organise my festive shopping event to raise awareness of mental health, help break the stigma and, importantly, to raise money for MIND to help others.

"We hope to see lots of ladies there enjoying the evening whilst raising money for an amazing cause, and it is free entry.

"My husband and I will also be holding a raffle with all proceeds going to MIND; we have had some amazing donations from local businesses and we are so so grateful - thank you.

"We are also having a sponsored balloon release on the evening, for £2 each, and individuals are adding special notes to the balloons about things they feel they need to release and let go regarding anything negative in their lives."

Reflecting on her own experience, she added: "It makes really emotional talking about my story; however I want to help as many people as possible - to let them know it's okay to not be okay, and that they aren't alone.

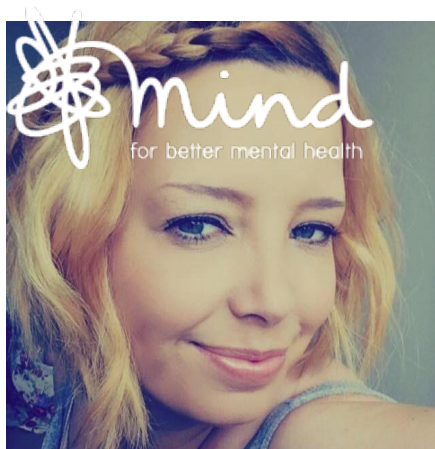
"I really want to break the mental health stigma and let people know it's okay to talk about it.

"I'm not ashamed to share my story and I'm not ashamed of how I felt.

"It's a mental illness that no one can help, and it creeps up on you and takes you totally by surprise."

100 years ago:- on 21st Nov 1916 that the British hospital ship HMHS Britannic hit a mine and sank off Greece. 30 people were killed and 1,036 survivors were rescued. The Britannic was the sister ship of the Titanic, converted for war service shortly after its launch. It was the biggest ship lost in WWI.

90 years ago:- on 11th Nov 1926 that Route 66 was established in the USA. It was one of the most famous highways in the country and was celebrated in popular culture.

80 years ago:- on 2nd Nov 1936 that the BBC Television Service was launched in the UK.

70 years ago:- on 1st Nov 1946 that Karol Wojtyla (later Pope John Paul II) was ordained a priest in Krakow, Poland.

60 years ago:- on 5th Nov 1956 that the first Premium Bond was sold in Britain (to the Lord Mayor of London).

40 years ago:- on 2nd Nov 1976 that Jimmy Carter was elected as the 39th President of the United States. (Inaugurated 20th Jan 1977.)

30 years ago:- on 6th Nov 1986 that Alex Ferguson was appointed manager of Manchester United FC.

25 years ago:- on 5th Nov 1991 that Robert Maxwell, Czech-born British newspaper publisher, media proprietor and politician, died. His body was found in the sea near his boat, off the coast of Tenerife.

Also 25 years ago:- on 14th Nov 1991 that Britain and the USA accused two Libyan intelligence agents of carrying out the bombing of the Pan Am jet that crashed in Lockerbie, Scotland, in 1988, and demanded that Libya hand them over to face trial.

Also 25 years ago:- on 18th Nov 1991 that C of E envoy Terry Waite and American educator Thomas Sutherland were released by Islamic Jihad in London after being held hostage since Jan 1987 and Jun 1985 respectively.

20 years ago:- on 12th Nov 1996 that the European Court of Justice ordered Britain to comply with the EU mandate of a maximum 48-hour working week.

Also 20 years ago:- on 15th Nov 1996 that England handed the Stone of Scone back to Scotland after 700 years.

15 years ago:- on 16th Nov 2001 that the first Harry Potter film, 'Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone' was released.

10 years ago:- on 5th Nov 2006 that Saddam Hussein, the former President of Iraq, was sentenced to death for his role in the massacre of 148 Iraqi Shi'ites in 1982. (He was executed on 30th Dec)

Remembrance – 100 years after the Somme

Remembrance Day this year will have a special significance. Almost exactly a century after the Battle of the Somme finally came to its inconclusive end (18th November) we shall once again be remembering all those who have lost their lives in war, or had their lives blighted by its consequences.

The unbelievable slaughter of the Somme – more than a million men were killed or wounded – made it perhaps the bloodiest battle of human history. The incessant bombardment of heavy artillery, the suicidal waves of attack by unprotected soldiers, the introduction, a few months from its close, of the first tanks in battle all contributed to the vast number of casualties, but so did the pointless efforts of both sides to break what was in fact a five month stalemate. This was a battle nobody won but a million men lost.

This year we shall once again make our prayers for peace and our reflective remembrance against a back-drop of a world that is stubbornly inclined to think that problems can be solved by fighting over them. In the Middle East and in parts of Africa there are still too many who believe that guns and bombs can solve things, when all the evidence of history is that they can't.

Today, a hundred years after the Battle of the Somme, historians still can't decide what the Great War was actually about. And the arrival of the Second World War in 1939 tells us that whatever anyone thought it was, five years of sickening killing had not settled it.

'We will remember them', we say. Surely the finest remembrance would be a world without violence. It still seems a long way off.

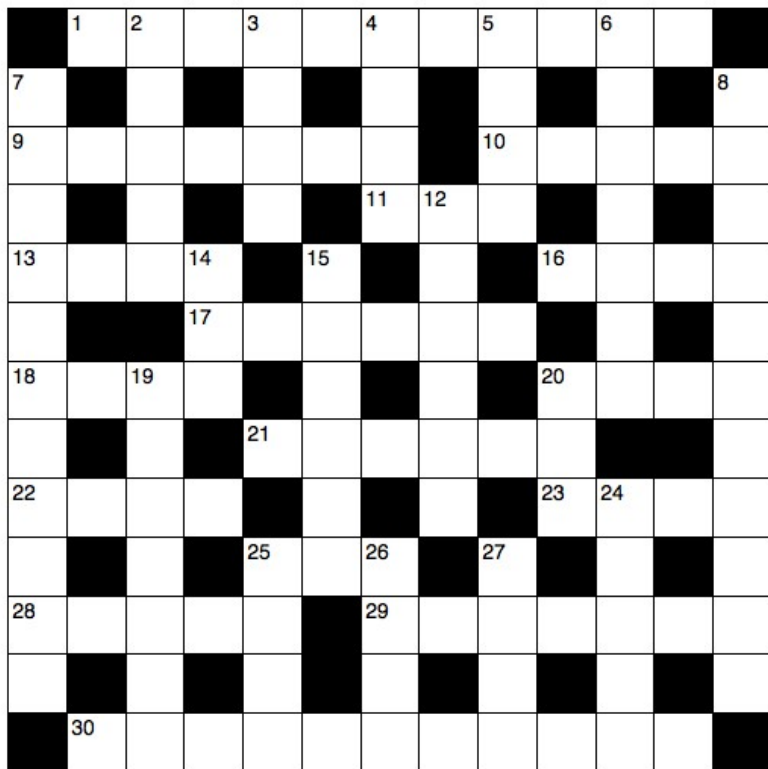

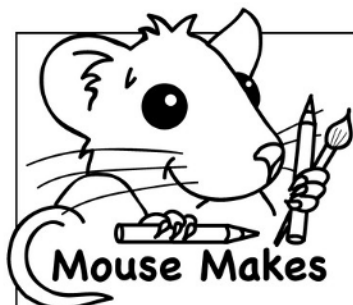

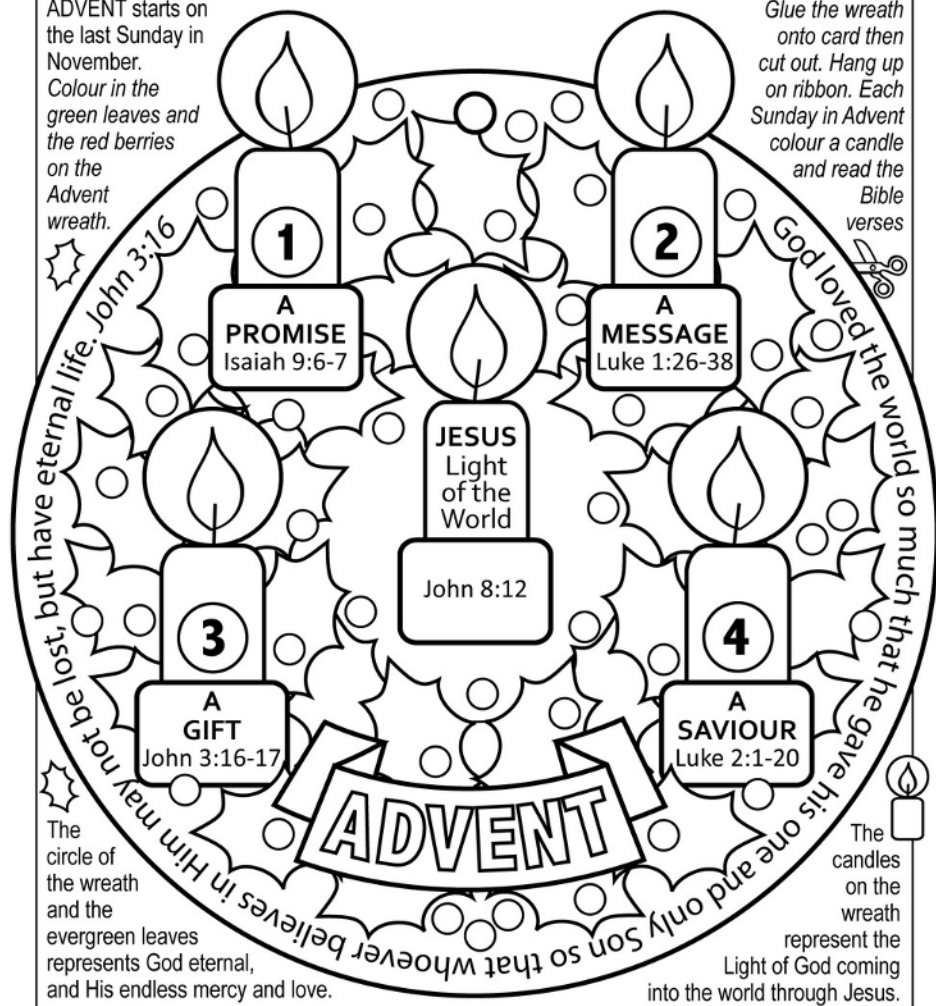

St MARTIN DE PORRES

Martin was born in 1579 in Lima, Peru, the son of a former slave. He grew up in poverty and was taken in by a religious order as a servant boy. The monks looked down on Martin because he was mixed-race but in time his behaviour led to the Dominican Order stopping their racial limits on admission and he was made a full brother. He worked tirelessly on behalf of the poor, starting an orphanage and a children's hospital.

During his lifetime he was seen in other places. An African slave said Martin came to comfort him and many others. When the same man later saw him in Peru, he was very happy to meet him again and asked Martin if he had had a good voyage; but Martin had never left Lima.

In pictures, Martin de Porres is shown as a young man with a broom, since he thought all work sacred, no matter how lowly. He is also shown with a dog, cat and mouse, all eating in peace from the one dish.

LOWER WASHBURN PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish members along with residents and businesses bordering the A658 and the B6161 are concerned about the danger of serious accidents due to the fast traffic along these roads.

The police and North Yorkshire County Council only record accidents where there has been a personal injury and the accident statistics show that there have only been a small number of accidents during this period. Anecdotal evidence suggests that there are far more accidents involving minor collisions and near misses which are not reported to the Police or North Yorkshire County council.

County Councillor Mr. Fort and District Councilor Mrs. Ryder along with parish representatives are meeting with highway officials to discuss how this situation may be improved.

The poor broadband speeds in rural affect households and businesses and the parish council has contacted our local MP Mr. Julian Smith about these concerns. He is pursuing this issue with the Chief Executive of Superfast North Yorkshire. May I suggest that anyone who is experiencing low broadband speed contacts Mr. Julian Smith at the House of Commons, London SW1A 0AA and lets him know of the difficulties you experience.

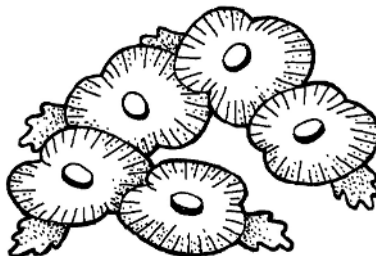

An Ordinary meeting of MWPC was held at Askwith Village Hall on 25th August 2016.

All parishes were represented, along with the Clerk and 14 members of the public and local PC officer Graham-Merrett. Co-opted councilor for Nesfield/Langbar Kristina Patterson and co-opted councilor for Askwith Carol Marston were welcomed to the council. During the Public session there was much discussion about the problem caused by Askwith School and the parking issues. To provide extra car parking space Askwith Village Hall Committee have been trying to negotiate with the school an agreed fee for the parking outside the village hall. Unfortunately the school constantly changes their requirements when an agreement seems to have been settled upon. The Local PC Graham-Merrett confirmed that he would visit the school when they return in September to have discussions with them as the current situation has safety implications for children and is causing traffic blockages during peak times.

The minutes from the Annual and Ordinary meeting on 19th May 2016 were adopted. Under highway matters the repair works at Ben Rhydding suspension bridge, the clearing of over grown vegetation to aid sight lines and recent resurfacing of Hallem Lane, Askwith were discussed with the Clerk to write to the relevant authorities about these items. HBC have confirmed that they are responsible for the litter bin on Weston Green and will in the future empty this when required.

Cllr White informed the meeting about WASPI (Women against state pension inequality) and how it is affecting many local women now and in future years. The council was in agreement to support this cause and will write to the government giving WASPI its full support.

HBC is introducing a charge of £39 per year for garden waste removal from March 2017. In 2018 all suitable properties will be able to receive this service. Clerk to write and ask what is meant by suitable properties.

The annual insurance is due for renewal on 1st October and it was agreed to continue with Zurich Municipal at a fixed rate of £284.77 for a three year period. This is an increase of £6.24

The Clerk had made a VAT reclaim with the council qualifying for a £31.95 rebate. Accounts were presented and adopted and planning matters were discussed with all planning matters and decisions available on the MWPC web site.

The web site home page has had over 845 hits, the new Parish map section has had 110 hits since it was introduced in May and the Transparency code has all the relevant 2015/2016 Audited accounts information

In the last magazine it was stated that Farnley Church does not have a Warden or PCC secretary and the Treasurer is standing down. Sadly, this painted a rather bleak picture of the Benefice's little gem! We have a Warden "in waiting", a meeting minute's secretary and other secretarial help. We do still need an official "Secretary" but we will ensure that the task is not onerous and within the time of whatever a volunteer feels he or she can give. The same will apply to a new treasurer in spring 2017. This role will be subdivided. Neither Treasurer nor Secretary are required to be church goers nor members of the PCC though it is often useful to be able to meet others.

The picture for Farnley is not at all bleak, in fact it is positive. All Saints Farnley may be the smallest church in the Benefice, yet it often has more attending than some of our larger neighbours – so we are alive and going forward! We have three regular services a month, sometimes more; baptisms and weddings. We have people who are keen and willing to see this Church go forward

Our social gatherings are well supported. The church is bright, and clean with Robert Thompson furniture, beautiful windows and tapestries done by one of our parishioners. And flowers at the appropriate times of the year. It has the best carpark and disabled access of all our churches and is the only church within the benefice with facilities within the actual church building itself as the vestry under the unusual Minstrels Gallery was converted a number of years ago, giving us a small hot drinks preparation kitchen and flower arranging area, with disabled access toilet. The church and pathways and carpark are all on the same level making it easy and for all. We have frequent walkers and cyclists visiting and resting in the churchyard. All Saints Church sits up high in the sunshine with restful views and unusually, has no tall trees overshadowing it so it feels bright and cheerful all year round. There are some recently replanted borders and the churchyard is quiet and peaceful and well maintained. And we have an overflow carpark if we need it.

This is the perfect church for a small country wedding, with a welcome from clergy and congregation to services and when banns are read. The church has had 5 weddings in this current year and we are looking forward to another near Christmas.
