



PALM SUNDAY, HOLY WEEK AND EASTER 2017

It is well known that Lent is a time of preparation for Easter day and beyond, however there isn't a gap between the end of Lent and Easter day. Palm Sunday and Holy Week are also part of that preparation.

In fact it's a more concentrated time as it's the last week to set time aside to contemplate Christ's last few days, to think about His last words and actions, ponder how His Disciples and others felt, realise what was going on in and around Jerusalem in those days when the Romans dominated God's people and occupied King David's city.

Join us as we shout 'Hosanna', reflect on those last few days, eat together and remember the Last Supper, pray together and reflect on Jesus' last night on the Mount of Olives, gather at the foot of the cross in wonder and awe at Jesus' love for us. This will help us to have more in us as we sing and shout 'Alleluia Christ is Risen!' and change from the ourple of Lent to white and gold of Easter.

Married to John in 1966 and moved to a cottage in Leathley, and there remained for the rest of her life.

Marcia loved Leathley and was at the heart of village life for over 50 years, as a well-respected and long standing member of the WI, she also served on the village hall committee, and worked tirelessly within the village community.

Leathley church played an important role in Marcia's life, as a place of worship and fellowship; she was a long standing PCC member, where her quiet and considered opinion was always respected. She was great supporter and fundraiser for the church, organising many events over the years, at 'Teas on The Green' Marcia's chocolate cakes and scones were legendary.

Marcia was a person of many talents and numerous interests, including Yorkshire and family history and was actively involved in various charities including the NSPCC. She particularly loved her garden and was extremely knowledgeable in all aspects of horticulture. Marcia and John opened their garden to the public several times for charitable fundraising events.

Despite her busy life Marcia still found time to travel including visits to Japan, New Zealand and Peru to mention a few but her favourite place was the east coast of Yorkshire and Robin Hoods Bay in particular. A devoted wife, loving mother to her four children and a very proud and special granny to her fourteen grandchildren, she really was at her happiest when surrounded by her family at home.

Marcia was the kindest and gentlest of souls and she will be fondly remembered and missed by so many.

I don't remember 1945 being very eventful - but it was.

Not because of my 9th birthday but because WWII ended in Europe.

Celebrations in UK. A mess across the Channel and in blitzed cities here. But I lived in the town of Stafford, almost away from it all.

So I was unaware of the political arguments about Europe (different now!) or the need Christians recognised to care for refugees. These were people shattered by war, people whose homelands had been taken over by the forces of Hitler's Nazi regime and then liberated by unavoidable violence: rather, at the time of writing, as Mosul is being liberated from totalitarian 'Islamic State'. Suffering doesn't stop when an occupying power has been driven out.

So it was that in 1945 Inter-Church Aid and Refugee Service was born. To become, in time, the Christian Aid we know and support. To raise essential funds, Christian Aid began Christian Aid Week in 1957. By inventing the house-to-house collection, Christian Aid gave everyone at home an easy way to help - cash in an envelope collected by an authorised local volunteer.

60th Anniversary Christian Aid Week 2017 runs from 14th to 20th May. Please don't turn your back on the red envelope that (hopefully) will come through your letter-box.

Owing to other commitments, several of our local volunteer collectors are unavailable this year. If you could help to fill a gap, please get in touch with me - I shall be very grateful! There is a sea of need out there: please let us not turn our backs. Unlike my early ignorance, we do know.

All In The Month Of April

90 years ago:- on 2nd April 1927 that BBC radio covered the annual University Boat Race between Oxford and Cambridge for the first time.

80 years ago:- on 27th April 1937 that the National Maritime Museum in Greenwich opened.

75 years ago:- on 18th April 1942 that the USA bombed mainland Japan for the first time, hitting Tokyo, Yokohama and other cities.

70 years ago:- on 1st April 1947 that the school leaving age in the UK was raised to 15.

65 years ago:- on 30th April 1952 that the diary of Anne Frank, a Jewish girl who died during the Holocaust, was published in English as 'The Diary of a Young Girl'.

50 years ago:- on 8th April 1967 that the UK won the Eurovision Song Contest for the first time, with the song 'Puppet on a String' sung by Sandie Shaw. The contest was held in Vienna, Austria.

40 years ago:- on 2nd April 1977 that the British race horse Red Rum won the Grand National for a historic third time. The record still stands today.

30 years ago:- on 1st April 1987 that President Reagan declared AIDS 'public health enemy No. 1'.

25 years ago:- on 5th April 1992 to Feb 1996 that the Bosnian War's Siege of Sarajevo took place.

Also 25 years ago:- on 27th April 1992 that Betty Boothroyd became the first female Speaker of the House of Commons.

20 years ago:- on 5th April 1997 that Britain's Grand National steeplechase was disrupted after the IRA sent coded bomb warnings. 60,000 people were evacuated from the Aintree course and the race was postponed.

A new way to read and enjoy your Bible

Bible Society has launched a new tool to help people search, read, engage with and share the Bible. It has a number of free-to-use features, specially created for the thousands of people a week who visit Bible Society's website to read the Bible.

Verse Builder is designed for those who like to share Bible verses via Facebook. This feature allows you to create an animated verse, set against a picture backdrop, which you can share to social media or download.

Flexi Reader is an innovative way of reading the Bible, which automatically displays the text at the reader's chosen speed. There's no need to lift a finger to scroll down the page – and you can choose how many words should appear on screen at once, and the speed of reading.

The new online tool also allows you to compare versions side by side. There are English versions to choose from, as well as beibl.net (the Bible in everyday Welsh).

The final new feature gives people the option to leave a public comment, save notes on the text or tag verses with a theme. As the community of Bible-readers grows, it will provide a rich resource of people's thoughts and reactions to Scripture.

The Thief on the Cross

Luke 23: 32-43

Luke's account of the crucifixion emphasises the mocking of the crowd, 'If you are the king of the Jews, save yourself' (35,37,39). In their view a Messiah does not hang on a cross and suffer. In considering the man who was crucified with Jesus, we are also confronted with the issue of how Jesus secures solvation for us.

One Criminal's Tounts

The words of one of those crucified with Jesus reflected the crowd's tounts: 'Aren't you the Christ? Save yourself and us.' He highlights the question of Jesus' identity: how can He save others, when He cannot save Himself from death? And yet, unlike his companion, he failed to see that the cross itself is the means of salvation.

What kind of Messiah was Jesus?

One Criminal's Faith

The other criminal's response in his last moments is a moving expression of

faith. When challenging the other man, he spoke of the utter injustice of the crucifixion: 'this man has done nothing wrong.' He perceived the truth that Jesus' death was on behalf of all people. In a wonderful picture of grace, 'remember me', he confessed his guilt and secured Jesus' forgiveness and mercy.

In what ways have we experienced God's grace?

The Messiah's Promise

In reply, Jesus promised the man life from the moment of death; 'Today you will be with me in paradise.' Jesus used the picture of a walled garden to help the man understand His promise of protection and security in God's love and acceptance eternally.

If you were to die tonight, how confident would you be of being with Jesus?

'For Christ died for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, to bring you to God.' (1 Peter 3:18).





Resurrection Work

(Acts 10:40-43) Strong arms of Jesus stretched out in His cross-work, opening Himself to die, opening the way for God's wonderwork to raise Him to life. to offer life to us today.

Our work - to believe in Jesus, to receive forgiveness and the Spirit,

as responders.

Easter Eggs

Askwith With Weston WI Report

Our speaker this month was Helen Murray Sharpe, a volunteer with Yorkshire Air Ambulance. We've welcomed their speakers before but not for a number of years, so it was good to have an update on their activities and to be reminded of the incredible service they provide. It's hard to believe that they've now been operating for 17 years and started with just one 20 year old helicopter. Helen said that the Top Gear Presenter, Richard Hammond's accident, and the very public gratitude he paid to Yorkshire Air Ambulance for getting him to hospital so quickly, eventually led to the BBC series 'Helicopter Heroes' which brought the work of the service to a huge audience and greatly increased donations enabling them to buy another second-hand helicopter.

In 2012/13 a decision was made to move one of their helicopters to Topcliffe in order to better serve North Yorkshire and their other helicopter base covering West and South Yorkshire was moved from Leeds Bradford Airport to Nostell Priory. Helen reminded us that Yorkshire's population is 5.1 million so the helicopters have to cover a huge area across 4 million acres and it was astonishing to hear that in the last 15 years the helicopters have transported 6000 people to hospitals across the region. Patients are always taken to one of four major trauma centres, Leeds General Infirmary, Hull Royal Infirmary, Sheffield Northern Hospital, and James Cook Hospital in Middlesborough, and 90% of the population of our county are within 20 minutes flying time of one of these hospitals.

In September 2016 the service finally took delivery of their first brand new helicopter, and in December last year a second new helicopter arrived as well. Each cost ± 6 million and is fully equipped with advanced medical equipment and now carries a fully trained doctor on board as well. In order to fund all of this they have to raise $\pm 12,000$ every day to keep the helicopters flying which is a huge responsibility. Helen's talk was so interesting and what a worthy cause this is.

Our 2017 season is now getting into full swing, in a couple of weeks we go to Hazlewood Castle for a talk about the Vavasour family who not only owned the castle but also Weston Manor and most of the land around Askwith and Weston, later in the month we're visiting the 'Victoria' exhibition at Harewood House and we have our Federation Spring Council meeting in Leyburn, plus we've visits planned later in the summer to Wentworth Woodhouse, Menwith Hill, and Yorkshire Wildlife Park. And there's our lunch club, walking group, and craft group. So we're looking forward to a very busy time.

We meet on the 2nd Thursday of the month at 7.30pm at Askwith Village Hall and we always welcome visitors and new members from around the area. We have members from Guiseley, Otley, Menston, Burley in Wharfedale, and Addingham, as well as Askwith and Weston, so everyone's very welcome wherever they live.
