

The Oldest Bible Comes Back To The UK

he world's oldest surviving complete Latin Bible returns to the UK this autumn. It left these shores for Rome 1302 years ago, when monks in the northeast of England sent it as a gift to Pope Gregory II.

The Codex Amiatinus was one of only three produced at the twin monasteries of Wearmouth and Jarrow. (One has since got lost, and the other survives in fragments.) It was kept safe for centuries at the Abbey of the Saviour in Monte Amiata, in Tuscany. Then in the 18th century it was sent to the Biblioteca Medicea Laurenziana, in Florence.

It is the Laurenziana which has now agreed to send it back to the UK, alongside the Lindisfarne Gospels, for its exhibition 'Anglo-Saxon Kingdoms', which begins in October.

The Bible is 12 inches thick, and weighs 35kg. It contains both Old and New Testaments, and was written on 1030 leaves made from the skins of at least 515 sheep. It has been called one of the greatest treasures of Anglo-Saxon times.

How To Improve Your Memory

on't forget to eat your greens – or you could be forgetting a lot of other things as well. It seems that a portion of green leafy vegetables each day can go a long way towards safeguarding the memory of older people. In a recent study, it was found that people who eat greens regularly can have a memory capacity equivalent to the memory of a person 11 years younger.

A recent study at Rush University Medical Centre in Chicago found that people in their 80s who ate just half a cup a day of certain green leafy vegetables (lettuce, spinach, kale and collard greens; all rich in vitamin K) had significantly better memory than those older people who did not.

Cut Your Calories To 1800 A Day

orget 2000 calories a day if you are a woman, and 2500 if you are a man: the latest health guidelines from Public Health England (PHE) are expected to recommend a 400 – 600 – 600 rule. That means restricting your calories to 400 for breakfast, 600 for lunch, and 600 for dinner. An additional two healthy snacks a day, of 100 calories each, are also permitted.

The government now believes that we are all consuming on average 200 - 300 MORE calories a day than we need. The new lower guideline is also thought to compensate for the fact that most people tend to underestimate the number of calories that they eat.

Good To Volunteer

hat is your work-life balance? Ideally, it should be a four-way effort of family, work, leisure and - very important - volunteering.

That is the belief of Sir Nick Parker, who served as Commander of the Land Forces from 2010 to 2012. He argues that young people, of between 10 and 20 years old especially, will themselves be helped by regular volunteering, as it helps them learn new skills, increases their resilience and self-confidence, and can improve their social mobility and life chances.

Now Sir Nick Parker has been calling on the Government to encourage people of all ages to get used to volunteering, as not only could it help revitalize civil society, it also can help young people to grow and mature, and get into the habit of playing an active, useful role in their communities.

All In The Month Of February

t was:

80 years ago, on 20th Feb 1938, that British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden resigned over Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain's policy of appeasement with Italy.

Also 80 years ago, on 24th Feb 1938, that the first toothbrushes with nylon bristles were introduced, by Du Pont. Until then toothbrushes had been made from the hair of boars or hogs.

70 years ago, on 28th Feb 1948, that the last British Army regiment left India.

65 years ago, on 5th Feb 1953, that sweet rationing ended in Britain.

Also 65 years ago, on 28th Feb 1953, that British scientists Francis Clark and James D. Watson announced that they had discovered the double-helix structure of DNA.

60 years ago, on 6th Feb 1958, that the Munich air disaster took place. A plane carrying the Manchester United Football team, plus support staff and journalists, crashed while attempting to take off from a slush-covered runway at Munich-Riem Airport. 23 people were killed, including 8 players.

Also 60 years ago, on 6th Feb 1958, that George Harrison, aged 14, auditioned to join John Lennon's skiffle group the Quarrymen (which later became the Beatles). The audition reportedly took place on a bus, and Lennon felt that Harrison was too young.

Also 60 years ago, on 17th Feb 1958, that

Pope Pius XII declared Saint Claire of Assisi (1194 - 1253) to be the patron saint of television. It was on the basis that she had been too ill to attend Mass, but had reportedly been able to see it and hear it on the wall of her cell.

50 years ago, on 19th Feb 1968, that the Thalidomide scandal's first compensation payments were awarded in Britain to 62 children born with deformities because their mothers had taken the drug during pregnancy. (Around 400 British children in all were affected.)

40 years ago, on 15th Feb 1978, that New Zealand beat England in a cricket match for the first time.

30 years ago, on 5th Feb 1988, that Comic Relief held its first Red Nose Day in the UK. It raised £15m for charity.

25 years ago, on 12th Feb 1993, that two ten-year-old boys abducted two-year-old James Bulger from a shopping centre near Liverpool. His mutilated body was found on a railway line nearby two days later. They were charged with abduction and murder.

20 years ago, on 23rd Feb 1998, that Osama bin Laden issued a fatwa against all Jews and Crusaders.

15 years ago, on 1st Feb 2003, that the US space shuttle Columbia disintegrated over Texas during re-entry, killing all seven astronauts.

Also 15 years ago, on 17th Feb 2003, that London's Congestion Charge scheme began.

'Lenten Valentines'

uring this month Ash Wednesday and Valentine's Day, share the same date! It seems an odd mix, yet there is an obvious link: love! Lent, beginning on Ash Wednesday, is about learning how to love God more, as we give Him space in our lives. It's also an opportunity to reflect on Jesus' experience in the wilderness (Luke 4:1-13).

Jesus was led into the desert by the Spirit (1), where He was tempted by Satan, but demonstrated the path of real love. Jesus is tempted to turn stones into bread. Love gets to the heart of human need, not just satisfying physical desires. Satan tempts Jesus to worship him. However, worshipping God is the beginning of love and results in sacrificial service to meet the needs of others. Finally, He is tempted to put God to the test, by jumping off the Temple. Only real love can change hearts by practical love and care.

Lent teaches us how to live out the love of God in practice, as we follow Jesus in the way of the cross.

Valentine was Christ's follower, committed to sharing God's love with others. We know little about him, except that he was a priest who lived in the 3rd Century AD and was martyred on February 14th. Emperor Claudius felt that soldiers in the Roman Army were distracted from their duty by their wives, and so attempted to outlaw marriage. It is believed that Valentine married couples in secret. He also helped Christians in Rome during times of persecution. He demonstrated the importance of showing real love in action.

In trying to understand the meaning of her revelations from God, Julian of Norwich found:

'What, do you wish to know your Lord's meaning in this thing? Know it well, love was his meaning.'





The first talk of the programme is on **Tuesday 20th February at the earlier time of 2pm.** Entitled **'How Churches Stand Up'**, David Barnard will talk on the properties of wood and stone and their influence on the changing appearance of churches, cathedrals and abbeys from Anglo-Saxon times through Early English, Decorated and Perpendicular medieval periods. Learn about arches, vaults and buttresses for a deeper appreciation of the churches you visit. This is an afternoon talk with a cream tea. Cost £7.50 (Members £6).

If the outdoors is more for you, on **Thursday 22nd February**, there is a guided walk through **Denton Dells.** This is a walk of 5.7 miles up through Denton for views over the Wharfe valley and back through Middleton. ur WI had a great start to the year with a talk by Dr. John Rhodes on Mercy Ships. There are four ships altogether which have been kitted out into modern, floating hospitals. They sail up and down the African coast, visiting a country by invitation, they stay at a port for about 10 months. Mercy Ships carry out thousands of operations, reaching people with little or no healthcare, they operate on cataracts, cleft palates, fistulas, tumours, as well as complex orthopaedic operations.

Mercy Ships literally transform lives. They aim to have a lasting impact by training local people, building better medical facilities and providing essential medical equipment in the countries they visit. They are staffed by volunteers who even have to pay for their own board and lodging on the ships.

Our WI doesn't have a formal meeting in December, but we're still pretty busy. In early December several members met to decorate a tree with handmade decorations as part of the Otley Christmas Tree Festival. We raised about £70 for Associated Countrywomen of the World, which works to improve lives of women in third world

countries. Thankyou to all who visited and donated.

We now have a bit of a tradition of a Christmas visit to a stately home, this year we visited Tatton Park which was beautifully decorated around the theme of the 12 days of Christmas.

In mid December we have a Christmas meal together, this year we went to Addingham for lunch, it was great having time to sit and socialise. Members also attended a WI carol service at Ripon Cathedral and workshops on Christmas crafts such as stained glass nativity and patchwork wreaths.

Mid Wharfedale Parish Council

n Ordinary meeting of MWPC was held at Askwith Village Hall on 16th November 2017.

All parishes were represented along with Cllr Lumley of NYCC and Cllr Wood of HBC.

Efforts are still being made to fill the vacancy for a councillor at Langbar. Further investigation to locate one of the missing upright sign poles was to be done thus enabling the "Welcome to Askwith" sign to be reinstated on Moor Lane. All MWPC polices were updated including a revised Risk Assessment which provided extra current information. The annual budget and precept were discussed. As various costs have been rising and the fact that HBC are withdrawing the Grounds Maintenance grant, meaning MWPC will have to cover extra maintenance costs it was agreed to increase the precept to \pounds 4385. The appointment of the internal auditor was discussed. It was resolved that Yorkshire Internal Audit Services should be appointed for the 2017/18 year. From 17th December HMRC are no longer accepting payments by cheque and will only accept monies via online banking. After various discussions it was resolved to update the Bank Mandate to allow the Chairman and Clerk to access online banking for HMRC issues, with cheques still to be signed by councilors for remaining items. Cllr Marston asked it the Clerk could write to NYCC in respect of the large hole which is cordoned off with barriers at East Beck Bridge to find out if any further works are planned. Cllr Shepherd asked if there was a job description for the role of a councillor. This was discussed and it was felt that as each councillor does different tasks within their parish, a job description would not be possible, but it was agreed that a councillor is there to represent parish views. Cllr Lumley reported that broadband installation was now 90% complete and the last phase had gone out to tender. The District Development Plan had now been submitted to the government. Kex Gill road scheme was out for public consultation and that it was hoped the road would be completed within 3 to 5 years.

The next meeting is $15^{\rm th}$ February 2018 at Askwith Village Hall starting at 7.45pm.


