

All In The Month Of April

t was:

175 years ago, on 5th April 1843 that Hong Kong was proclaimed a British crown colony. (Hong Kong had been ceded to Britain in perpetuity in the Treaty of Nanking, signed in August 1842, at the end of the First Opium War.)

Also 175 years ago, on 15th April 1843 that Henry James, the American-born English novelist was born. Best known for Daisy Miller, The Portrait of a Lady, and The Turn of the Screw, among others.

100 years ago, on 1st April 1918 that Britain's Royal Air Force (RAF) was founded when the Royal Flying Corps and the Royal Naval Air Service merged.

Also 100 years ago, on 16th April 1918 that Spike Milligan was born. This Indian-born Irish comedian and writer was a member of The Goons, known for his anarchic sense of absurdity.

Also 100 years ago, on 21st April 1918 that Manfred von Richthofen ('The Red Baron'), German WWI fighter ace, was shot down in France, aged 25.

90 years ago, on 25th April 1928 that the first budget was broadcast in the UK. Chancellor of the Exchequer Winston Churchill's annual budget speech in the House of Commons was broadcast live on BBC radio.

80 years ago, on 9th April 1938 that the first football match was broadcast on television: Scotland beat England 1 - 0.

75 years ago, on 5th April 1943 that the renowned German theologian and anti-Nazi dissident Dietrich Bonhoeffer was arrested by the Gestapo. He was imprisoned for 18 months, including two Nazi concentration camps. He was executed in April 1945.

70 years ago, on 3rd April 1948 that the USA's

Marshall Plan for European recovery after WW2 went into effect.

Also 70 years ago, on 7th April 1948 that The World Health Organisation (WHO) was founded.

60 years ago, on 4th to 7th April 1958 that the first Aldermaston March was held. Members of the Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament (CND) walked from Hyde Park Corner, London to the Atomic Weapons Research Establishment at Aldermaston, Berkshire.

50 years ago, on 3rd April 1968 that American Baptist minister and Afro-American civil rights leader Martin Luther King, Jr. gave his famous 'I've Been to the Mountaintop' speech at a rally in Memphis, Tennessee. It was his last ever speech, as he was assassinated next day, aged 39. Noted for his promotion of non-violent civil disobedience, including the march on Washington. In the days after his death there were race riots in dozens of major US cities.

30 years ago, on 23rd April 1988 that Michael Ramsey, Baron Ramsey of Canterbury, the 100th Archbishop of Canterbury (1961-74), died.

25 years ago, on 26th April 1993 that NASA launched its space shuttle Columbia on mission STS-55. It landed safely on the 6th May. During this mission the space shuttle passed one year in space.

Also 25 years ago, on 29th April 1993 that Queen Elizabeth 2 announced that Buckingham Palace would open to the public for the first time, to raise funds to repair fire damage at Windsor Castle.

Also 25 years ago, on 30th April 1993 that Cern the creators of the World Wide Web, announced that it could be used for free by anyone.

20 years ago, on 10th April 1998 that The Good Friday Agreement was signed in Northern Ireland.

Opportunities to learn more about local Wildlife

re you interested in wildlife? We are very lucky in Nidderdale Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB) to share our home with spectacular, and in some cases, threatened wildlife including Curlew, Great-crested newts and Water voles.

We are working with volunteers, families, naturalists, students and others to gather information on over 50 species right across the AONB, so that we can look after them better in the future.

This Spring and Summer we are hosting lots of free events and training sessions all around the AONB. We also have a new campaign to find out more information about four species of owl – and need as many people as possible in our local area to tell us when they see/hear an owl! Don't go there

This is sobering: cigarettes are so habit -forming that experimenting with just one cigarette has led to two-thirds of those who try them going on to become daily smokers.

Researchers at Queen Mary University London speak of 'the remarkable hold that cigarettes can establish after a single experience.' Prof Peter Hajek, the lead researcher, said: 'The UK is seeing a dramatic reduction in smoking at the moment and this tallies with recent findings that only 19 per cent of 11 - 15 year-olds have ever tried a cigarette, so the good news is that we are on the right track.'







"Philip Wilby a British composer, was educated at Leeds Grammar School and Keble College, Oxford. He joined the University of Leeds as a Lecturer in the Department of Music in 1972, where he taught various composition, liturgy, directing, and score reading classes.

Composing for many different instruments and ensembles, Philip Wilby is nevertheless most known for his compositions for brass band, many based on his strong Christian beliefs. Some works are written especially to be used as test pieces in brass band contests all over the world.

Philip Wilby has also given much time to writing for liturgical purposes and his choral works include the St Paul's Service (1988) commissioned for the Choir of St Paul's Cathedral, and The Trinity Service (1992) commissioned by Norwich Cathedral for the Norwich Festival of Contemporary Church Music.

Some items of interest.

arrogate B. C. is having major boundary changes which means that the wards will be changing. As a result there will be council elections in May 2018. These will also include parish elections. Anyone wishing to stand for the position of parish councillor can obtain a nomination pack from the Civic Centre, St. Luke's Avenue, Harrogate HG12AE. Completed packs must be returned to the elections office by the 6 April.

The Parish Members have agreed that there should be no increase to the parish precept for 2018-2019 and it will remain at £7750.

The Parish members continue to have concern about the erosion of the riverbank in Castley and continue to press the Environment Agency and North Yorkshire County Council to take action.

The parish have recently employed local farmers to cut back overgrown hedges in Castley to improve sight lines and in Farnley to clear debris from the roads.

Last year North Yorkshire carried out resurfacing in the parish area but we have concerns that this is eroding in some areas and as a result the parish caretaker carried out an inspection. A report identifying the affected areas has been passed to the highways department.
