The collection envelope featured Marcelin and his teenage daughters, presently living in a concrete hut just 2metres square since their home was destroyed by storm. We have given hope, as well as the prospect of a decent home again, and enabled local craftsmen to do the work needed.

Final result next month, but grateful thanks to all in the meantime.

The Way I See It Holidays and Holy-days

■ oing to go somewhere nice for your. Inolidays?' is the standard hairdresser's opening gambit at this time of year. 'Yes', I reply, 'I'm staying here'. They laugh politely, but clearly that's not their idea of a holiday. In an average life holidays go through stages. Do you remember your late teens, and the thrill of independence - hitch-hiking with a friend across Germany, or scuba diving, or climbing mountains or camping (in the rain)? Then it's couples, and memorable meals in little cafes in Italy or France. Next, perhaps, it's children - warm sunshine, beaches, Spain or Cornwall. Then it's retirement, and apart from grand-parent duties it's cruises ('cheaper than staying at home!' they tell me, but I don't believe it).

The final stage is where I am now, the holiday season as a time when the fever of life cools, when there's room on the buses and trains, and blissful idleness punctuated by the occasional theatre outing or visit to Lord's to snooze and watch county cricket.

Each phase has its appeal, and each can fulfil the fundamental principle of a holiday, which is hidden in the very word. It is, of course, a holy-day, because God commanded us to rest as well as work, and space and time to think, reflect and pray are precious holiday gifts.

At the different stages of life our holiday needs are different. What it should offer is a change from the normal, a new environment (even if it's only the local park) and new experiences to treasure during the months of winter. God invented the Sabbath because we needed it. Enjoy your holy-days, wherever or whatever they are.

From the Vicor

he recent Blue Planet II series exposed just how much plastic waste is an issue in our seas. The Prime Minister has called plastic waste 'one of the great environmental scourges of our time.' The best estimates suggest 10 million tonnes of plastic ends up in our oceans, contaminating and killing sea life. How should we view this issue from a Christian perspective?

When God created the universe, He saw 'everything He had made, and indeed, it was very good.' (Genesis 1:31). He calls us to share in His care of creation: 'Rule over the fish in the sea and the birds of the air and over every living thing that moves on the ground.' (Genesis 1:28). Our rule over living creatures is not an excuse to exploit them in a selfish way. As those who made in the image of God, we are entrusted to care for them with responsibility and trustworthiness.

Why do the sea creatures being killed by plastic matter? Because of human rebellion against God (see Genesis 3), our relationship with God and His creation was damaged. No longer do we live with living creatures in harmony and interdependence. Yet after the flood, when Noah rescued the animals in the ark, they are included in God's everlasting promise to protect the earth: 'I now establish my covenant with you and with your descendants after you, and with every living creature that was with you.' (Genesis 9:9,10).

What is our response to be? Where is God calling us, as His people in this time and place, to make a stand in protecting His creation? Time for a plastic revolution?

70 years of the National Health Service

he National Health Service began operating 70 years ago, on 5th July 1948, when Sylvia Beckingham, 13, was admitted to hospital in Manchester to be treated for a liver condition.

It was the climax of a hugely ambitious plan by Labour Health Secretary Aneurin Bevan to bring good health care free to all at the point of delivery. The health service would be available to everyone and financed entirely from taxation, which meant that people paid into it according to their means.

It was based on a report by William Beveridge in 1942. The problem with it remains the huge increase in costs resulting from, among other things, advances in medical science, drugs and machinery. As Andy McSmith wrote in *The Independent* ten years ago: "It seems no amount of money will satisfy the infinite demand for better NHS care."

Within a few years prescription charges were introduced, as well as a charge for dental treatment. The current prescription charge is £8.80 per item, and dental charges are huge.

Saving the NHS seems to be a national preoccupation in the 21st century. The Christian Medical Fellowship is campaigning to emphasise the vital and radical need for Christians within it.

Is There Poverty In Our Local School?

re there children in our local school who are living in poverty? There could well be. At least, teachers right across the country report that they are now having to wash children's clothes and lend parents money, as they report increasing poverty among their pupils.

A joint survey by the National Education Union and the Child Poverty Action Group has found that 16 per cent of schools now offer free or subsidised meals, and the same proportion also have a clothes bank. Meanwhile, four per cent even provide emergency loans to struggling parents.

Some staff told of how they keep a washing machine and tumble dryer on site, as well as clean underwear for pupils sent to school wearing dirty clothes. As one head teacher from Scarborough explained: 'We've had parents who don't have enough money to put in the electric meters, so they do not have enough hot water to wash the children's clothes.'

Another teacher, from Portsmouth, says, 'The difference now is the number of kids you are having to provide for. It was always the one or two kids, now it is seven, eight, nine, 10 of those kids.' 60 per cent of teachers said they felt that the extent of poverty in their schools had become worse since 2015. The Child Poverty Action Group called it 'heartbreaking'.

All In The Month Of July

t was:

200 years ago, on 30th July, that Emily Bronte, the British writer, was born. She was best known for her novel, Wuthering Heights.

175 years ago, on 19th July that the British steamship SS Great Britain, was launched. Designed by Isambard Kingdom Brunel, it was the longest passenger ship in the world at the time. It is now a museum ship and visitor attraction in Bristol Harbour.

100 years ago, from 15th July to 6th August that the WWI Second Battle of the Marne took place. It was the last major German offensive on the Western Front. Allied victory.

90 years ago, on 2nd July 1928 that all women aged 21 and over were granted the right to vote in the UK, when the Representation of the People Act (Equal Franchise) came into effect. This Act made men and women's voting rights equal.

80 years ago, on 9th July, 1938 that 35 million gas masks were issued in Britain, in anticipation of the Second World War.

75 years ago, on 24th July to 3rd August that WW2 Operation Gomorrah saw the Allies carry out a massive eight-day-round-the-clock bombing of the city of Hamburg. 70 years ago, on 5th July 1948 that Britain's National Health Service began operating. 65 years ago, on 27th July 1953 that the Korean War ended. A peace treaty was signed and the 38th parallel became the official boundary between communist

North Korea and anti-communist South

Korea. (Tensions continued unabated.)

50 years ago, on 1st July 1968 that Britain, the USA, the Soviet Union and 58 other nations signed the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty. It came into effect in March 1970.

40 years ago, on 25th July 1978 that the birth of the world's first test-tube baby, Louise Joy Brown, took place in Oldham, UK.

30 years ago, on 6th July 1988 that the Piper Alpha oil rig disaster took place. An explosion and fire on the North Sea oil rig Piper Alpha killed 167 people. It was the world's worst offshore oil disaster.

20 years ago, on 5th to 12th July 1998 that the Drumcree conflict in Northern Ireland took place when Protestants rioted after security forces prevented the annual Orange Order march through Portadown from taking place. There were around 550 attacks on security forces and Catholic civilians.

15 years ago, on 27th July 2003 that a team from the BBC reported that the Loch Ness Monster did not exist. They had combed every inch of the loch using 600 sonar beams guided by satellite navigation and found nothing. The search operation was covered in their documentary *The Search for the Loch Ness Monster*.

10 years ago, on 28th July 2008 that the Grand Pier fire in Weston-super-Mare took place. The pavilion was completely destroyed, but then rebuilt and reopened in October 2010

The Parish, Annual and Ordinary meeting of MWPC was held at Askwith Village Hall on 17th May 2018.

All parishes were represented. Cllr Crossley of Weston and Cllr Shepherd were both voted on as Chairman and Vice Chairman.

Due to recent boundary changes elections were held 2 years early on 3rd May with all MWPC councilors standing unopposed. The council is currently made up of the following councilors. Nesfield/Langbar Susan Ellis, Kathryn Chivers. Middleton, David Powell. Denton, Alison White. Askwith, Carol Marston, Martin Whitley, Claire Shepherd. Weston, Francis Caton, Jane Crossley. The parish still has vacancies for two councilors, one for Nesfield/Langbar and one at Denton so if you would like to volunteer to put something back into the community by attending four council meetings a year, where you can express the views of your parish and also have input on local planning issues, then please contact the clerk as below.

The accounts for 2017/18 were presented. It was resolved to accept the Annual Governance Statement. An internal audit had been undertaken and as there were no issues from this and the accounts were adopted.

Clerk had written to the Denton Estates to enquire if they were the owners of Denton Triangle. Mr. Bush from the Estate had verbally confirmed it was owned by the Estate, but he was going to put this in writing and the Clerk was still awaiting this confirmation. Clerk to write again and request this information. It was confirmed that trees had been cut down to the left of the triangle which allowed large vehicles to negotiate the junction easier without damaging the Green.

The Clerk had produced a General Data Protection Policy and it was proposed Cllr Whitley and resolved that this should be accepted.

Highway matters. Cllr Caton asked if the Clerk could write in respect of the poor road conditions which included numerous pot holes and edges of the road which are falling away at Church Lane and Moor Lane Weston.

Cllr Lumley from NYCC confirmed that the Kex Gill by-pass was still on track to be complete in 3 years even though it had various complex environmental issues to resolve. NYCC were now stricter when issuing licences for contractors that excavate the road as it was felt that a lot of the poor road condition was caused by unsatisfactory road reinstatement. Cllr Lumley had been awarded a £5000 grant for supporting small and local projects. He has also been given a £5000 grant for local Highway issues that may fall outside the NYCC net. He also reported that Allerton Park recycling centre was now working with no waste now being sent to land fill and the recycle centre providing enough electric for 40,000 homes per year. Cllr Oldham from HBC reported that she was working on a project to reduce the use of plastic and this included providing drinking fountains in public places.

Planning matters were discussed and the Clerk confirmed that the Web home page has now had 5397 hits up from 4733 in February. Various questionnaires and surveys had been added.

The next meeting is 23rd August 2018 at Askwith Village Hall starting at 7.45pm.

The Council received an update on the plans for the realignment of the A59 at Kex Gill from North Yorkshire County Council Transport Planning and will be kept informed and consulted on options and proposals moving forward.

A series of highways issues and maintenance requirements were identified by councillors and will be reported.
