

'That They May Be One'

The last week of January was the week of prayer for Christian Unity, which is a matter close to my heart.

I've been very fortunate that over the years there have been many opportunities for me to work with colleagues from all Christian denominations. Usually this has been within the sphere of the different churches' work in education. It has also included many occasions when I have shared, and lead worship, in a great variety of churches and chapels. Indeed, for the months of August, for several years and many years ago, a Baptist minister and I collaborated in providing an ecumenical 'Drive-in-Church' on the doorstep of the Bishop of Durham's Palace!

Yet, after all this time, we are still praying for Christian Unity.

I have reflected on this even more at present when there is so much division nationally and internationally. All forms of media – not least among them social media networks such as Twitter – often foster these divisions. Emotional words and pictures reinforce people's fears, prejudices and stereotypes. Of course, we all have our own subjective views. These may be no more than preferences, but they can soon become prejudices especially when viewing the vast variety of people throughout the world. We have our fears some of which we know are irrational but nonetheless they feel real. Perhaps other fears are also irrational but we don't recognise them as such.

Is there, then, any hope for unity be it within the Church or across people of different nations, races, religions, culture or other groupings?

I'm optimistic enough to believe so, once we're open minded enough to review our views in the light of reason and by seeking the truth. I don't minimise the challenge this presents. Therefore, I suggest, it is a collaborative activity. It requires dialogue and discussion. Since we've not seen much of that within the political divisions in our own country in recent months perhaps the Church might lead the way and be an example in actively seeking unity. Perhaps also a challenge to us as individuals to learn more about the views of others in the spirit of honest and reasonable discussion. I also believe that, as my introductory paragraph suggests, working together in a spirit of collaboration with those who share different views is so very enriching.

'That they may be one' are the words of Jesus which have always been interpreted as his prayer for the Church. Too narrow a view, perhaps, when we remember his mission and message was to the whole world.

Will you make that prayer yours too?



In Memoriam – Lena Boldero (nee Bradley)

Lena was the daughter of Mark and Agnes Bradley. The Bradley family were well-known in the Washburn Valley as farmers. They farmed High Wood Farm until 1947 when Mark and Agnes moved to Croft Farm in Timble village, with Lena and her brother Harry.

Mark and Agnes were stalwarts of Timble Methodist Chapel and Lena followed Agnes as the organist. She was Senior Steward of the chapel until her illness in 2017 forced her retirement, and she played the organ for the last time in November 2017. She was able to attend the Chapel Anniversary in July 2018.

Lena worked for many years as a cook at the Methodist Children's Home at Hilton Grange in Bramhope, which is why her baking (those scones!) was so sought after at coffee mornings in the Robinson Library. In 1998 Lena married Geoff Boldero, whom she had known in the Second World War when Geoff was evacuated from London to Timble. Although they had not met for many years, it was when Geoff made a nostalgic visit to Timble that their friendship was renewed.

In the Harrogate care home where she spent her last months, Lena was visited by many friends and relations, including Harry's sons and their families. She was always an inspiration to her visitors, with a smile and handclasp, though latterly she had been less aware of her surroundings.

Geoff was beside Lena when she died peacefully on 1st January, 2019, aged 86. She is much missed in the life of the village and Timble Methodist Chapel.

St Valentine's Day

falls on 14th February and since the 18th Century has been associated with the declaration of love, albeit anonymously. Originally this might be through the offering of sweets or flowers, and now more commonly by the sending of an unsigned card.

One suggestion is that St Valentinus was a Roman Christian who performed weddings for soldiers in the Roman army, even though they were not permitted to marry. According to this story, Valentinus was sentenced to death for his offence, but during his imprisonment prayed for the blind daughter of his judge, who miraculously recovered. Before his execution he left her a note, which he signed 'Your Valentine.'

All of us long to know that we are loved by someone, but declaring our love to another is always a risky business since we may be rejected. They may consider us not attractive enough, or unsuitable in any number of other ways. The pain of unrequited love is indeed great, and so many of us hold back because of the fear of rejection.

One thing we can be sure of, however, is that we are loved by God. He loves us because He made us, and likes us as we are. He loves us because He gave His Son to die for us, and thought we were worthy of such a sacrifice. Here is One who knows everything about us and loves us just the same. His love is unchanging and unending and we need never fear His rejection.

Here is the best declaration of love ever made. God says to you, "I have loved you with an everlasting love (Jeremiah 31:3)."

Washburn Parish Council

Washburn Parish Council covers the areas of Blubberhouses, Fewston, Norwood and Timble. The Parish Council is the first tier of local government and is a body of volunteers elected to represent the views of their community.

The Parish Council met in early January to agree the parish budget for the upcoming financial year. The Council agreed a parish precept of £7,500 for the year 2019-20. This precept will be used to ensure local maintenance works by our caretaker, upkeep of the Meagill Lane Chapel, and equipment maintenance at the Swinsty Moor Car Park defibrillator, as well as ensuring the Council meets its statutory obligations and responsibilities through the Parish Clerk.

In addition, Washburn Parish Council continues to report highways issues affecting the parish; monitor and comment on local planning applications or major proposals such as the A59 Kex Gill road realignment; and inform residents of activities and events in the parish on our noticeboards and website.

The next meeting of Washburn Parish Council will be held on Monday 4th March 2019 at Norwood Social Hall, commencing at 7.30pm.

The Rectory St James the Least

My dear Nephew Darren

We have just returned from our annual parish three-day silent retreat at St Epiphanius' Priory. We had the usual attendees: those husbands who see it as an opportunity to stop their wives talking, however briefly; those wives who can keep their husbands temporarily from the 19th hole at the golf club; and those who want to see if it might be a suitable home in which to park an inconvenient relative.

It can come as quite a shock for first-timers: the ladies are appalled to discover that there is neither coffee shop nor hairdressers, and the men that there is no bar or billiards table. The resident community certainly frowned on the four men among us who were discovered silently pushing a car down the drive late one evening before starting it at the main gates as they escaped to the nearest pub. Those of us who are older hands know to bring our own supplies – carefully wrapped, so that the clinking of bottles is not too obvious as one ascends the main staircase. The near universal retreat to bedrooms before dinner is less an opportunity for quiet reflection and more one for a restorative sherry.

The more experienced also know that temperatures in the house are Siberian. All the movement and hand waving during Services is less charismatic enthusiasm and more an attempt to maintain blood flow to the extremities. The series of addresses were given by an aged member of the community. That some of our party fell asleep during the addresses was excusable; that the person giving them also occasionally did so, was not.

And so we return, knowing that we have done our bit once again for the spiritual vigour of the parish, and also that three days of vegetarian cooking will mean a long queue at the village butchers tomorrow morning.







The Presentation of Christ in the Temple/ Candlemas

Candlemas, 2 February, comes exactly 40 days after Christmas. In New Testament times 40 days old was an important age for a baby boy: it was when they made their first 'public appearance'. Mary, like all good Jewish mothers, went to the Temple

with Jesus, her first male child - to 'present Him to the Lord'. Thus, we have the Festival of the Presentation of Christ in the Temple. (Luke 2: 22-40) So where does the Candlemas bit come in? Jesus is described in the New Testament as the Light of the World, and early Christians developed the tradition of lighting many candles in celebration of this day.

An Ordinary meeting of MWPC was held at Askwith Village Hall on 22nd November 2018.

All parishes were represented along with Cllr Lumley of NYCC.

New Councillor for Nesfield/Langbar Mrs. J Olby was welcomed to the council.

The Clerk had prepared a budget for 2019/20. This was discussed and it was felt that the council was able to work within this budget, it was then resolved to keep the precept at £4385. The appointment of the internal auditor was discussed. It was resolved that Yorkshire Internal Audit Services should be appointed for the 2018/19 year. MWPC policies had been updated and it was Proposed Cllr White, seconded Cllr Marston and resolved that the following policies should be adopted en-bloc. Standing Orders, Procedures & Policies, Financial Regulations, Financial Risk Assessment, Code of Practice for Handling Complaints, Freedom of Information Publication Scheme, Freedom of Information cost, Code of Conduct.

Under Highway matters the Clerk was asked to write to NYCC Highways regarding dangerous manhole cover on the grass verge by Askwith Chapel/Reservoir. A broken drain at Four Lane ends Askwith. Loose manhole cover at Nesfield village turning. The road at Church Lane Weston falling away and road subsidence by Denton phone box. Cllr Lumley reported that the new road at Kex Gill was progressing to planning stage and it was hoped to start works in 2020 with a 14 month build time. The NYCC 30MPH speed activated sign policy was being reviewed and it was hoped this would make the signs more accessible to parish councils. NYCC had plenty of salt in stock for the coming winter. A new management team had taken over at Area6 Boroughbridge. The Local Plan had been lodged with the inspector. Harrogate lottery has had a successful start and it was hoped to raise £49,000 for local projects. Accounts for the period August to November were presented and planning issues discussed. The web site had now had 5858 visits. The web address will change in the next few weeks due to hosting issues.

Askwith With Weston WI



The past couple of months have been a busy time for our WI. We've celebrated our 70th birthday with a thanksgiving service at Weston Church, enjoyed festive cooking and floral demonstrations, made stained glass Christmas decorations, visited Castle Howard dressed in all its festive finery, enjoyed a super Christmas lunch at the Clevedon, trimmed a tree at Otley's Christmas tree festival, and attended our Federation Carol Service at Ripon Cathedral.

We have a fantastic selection of speakers booked for 2019 and at our first meeting of the New Year we welcomed Andrew Fisher whose family have owned and developed Swincar Nursery at Guiseley for more than 50 years.

Despite Andrew's protestations that this wasn't something he normally did he gave us a really interesting potted history about the family nursery. Apparently there has been a nursery on the site for 150 years and for many years it was owned by the Co -op who used it to grow produce and flowers for their numerous shops in the area. When the Fishers bought the site in 1964 both the house and greenhouses were pretty derelict. Andrew's father set about repairing the glasshouses, bringing the growing areas back to life, and installing coke fired boilers for heating. He grew vegetables and flowers which he sold in Bradford Market, set up a fledgling wholesale business, and also sold to local shops. The nursery was almost entirely wholesale until Andrew left school and came on board and then they decided to venture into retail selling direct from the nursery. The retail business accelerated very quickly and within a year they had moved completely out of wholesale and begun to invest in machinery to automate some of the more labour intensive aspects of the operation such as seed sowing.

Nowadays Andrew travels far and wide to buy stock for the nursery concentrating particularly on Holland, but they continue to produce thousands of value for money bedding plants each year, as anyone who visits the nursery will know.

Andrew went on to field numerous questions on all manner of gardening topics and, despite his early reservations, he was a really entertaining speaker.

We're beginning to plan our trips this year which so far include a visit to Goldsborough Hall in February to see the snowdrop display and both Allerton Waste Recovery and Norton Conyers house and garden later in the year.

As well as our own monthly meetings and visits our Federation is planning some exciting trips and events too over the next twelve months.

Our next meeting will be on Thursday 14th February, and because work is being carried out at the village hall, we'll be meeting at The Askwith Arms. We'll be welcoming Beth Hughes from By Betty Headwear who'll be talking about her career as a milliner and also bringing lots of hats for us to try.


