# Walls!

To live in Yorkshire is to live surrounded by drystone walls. As I am out walking I often stand in wonder at the craft and sheer hard work that went into building them; some still sturdy after 2 or more hundred years. These walls helped to tame the wild moorland and still keep livestock safe.

While walls can be protective they can also be unhelpful barriers; especially the walls we put between ourselves and others. These walls are often invisible but still powerful at excluding others and we see this so clearly in the division and prejudice in our nation and world today.

As we approach Lent and Easter I am reminded of Jesus' great prayer at the Last Supper. "I pray not only for them, (the disciples), but also for those who believe in me because of their message. I pray that they may all be one." (John 17:20-21) We are over a year now without a Vicar, and as I write this letter not knowing the outcome of the latest round of adverts I want to warn against the danger of despair which can lead to us building walls around our little communities rather that reaching out to each other in mutual support.

Barry wrote about this in his February letter and so has Bishop Helen-Ann who is saying much the same thing in her February Diocesan letter. "God calls us and invites us to work together to grow the kingdom of God in such a way that its borders are always extending. When so much of the discourse of the current time is about walls and breaking long-held connections, there is an obligation and opportunity for people of faith to proclaim a different narrative: one that speaks of hope and optimism about our future, and a willingness to work together in a spirit of trust."

An important part in breaking down walls is to get to know each other. It has been the tradition of the churches and chapels to have occasional Benefice Services where we all share one service and get to know each other a little better. To make these times even more special I Have invited our new Bishop and forthcoming new Archdeacon to take these services which will be distributed around the churches so that all get a turn! Nick bishop of Leeds has also been invited for September. Please do come and join us! (See details of dates etc. in this magazine)

# Christ blessing John the Baptist – by Moretto da Brescia

George Herbert wrote a poem entitled 'Lent' which contains these lines:

Who goeth in the way which Christ hath gone, Is much more sure to meet with Him than one That travelleth by-ways.

And so each Lent we seek to journey with our Lord through the 40 days of this season. Lent is an Old English word for 'Spring.' It is not a negative, depressing time, but a season full of hope and promise. We begin it on Ash Wednesday when we are encouraged to look at our lives honestly, seeing what we need to turn from and where we need to grow. Jesus always had a soft spot for sinners, and so aware of our own sins, we begin Lent in a positive frame of mind. We rejoice in the welcome and invitation He gives to follow Him.

This month's painting in the National Gallery has a very unusual theme. It shows Christ blessing John the Baptist by Moretto da Brescia, an Italian artist who died in 1554. It is not a scene we find in the Gospels, but it is likely that the artist was thinking of that moment in Matthew's Gospel when John admits that he needs to be baptised by Jesus.

"Let it be so now," Jesus replies, and He is baptized by John. It is the prelude to our Lord's wilderness experience – that time of testing when Jesus emerged with heart and will purified and refined for His ministry. Around Jesus and John in this painting we see the hills and countryside which lead to that wilderness.

As we are drawn into this intimate scene, we can give thanks for our own baptism and pray that Jesus will bless us as we see Him blessing John the Baptist. George Herbert allowed the Christ he loved to transform his life. We pray for the blessing of Jesus to transform us with His grace and mercy as we say with the poet, 'Welcome dear season of Lent.'

# All In The Month Of March

It was:

400 years ago, on 12th March 1619 that Richard Burbage, English A major shareholder in the died. Globe Theatre, and a friend and business partner of William Shakespeare.

200 years ago, on 28th March 1819 that Sir Joseph Bazalgette, British civil engineer, was born. He created London's sewer network as well as several notable bridges, embankments and streets.

150 years ago, on 6<sup>th</sup> March 1869 that the first recognisable periodic table of the elements was published Russian chemist Dmitri Mendeleev.

100 years ago, on 17<sup>th</sup> March 1919 that Nat King Cole, the American jazz/ swing/pop singer and pianist was born. (Died 1965)

80 years ago, on 2<sup>nd</sup> March 1939 that Howard Carter. the British Egyptologist archaeologist and died. He discovered the tomb of the pharaoh Tutankhamen in 1922.

Also 80 years ago, that the fictional superhero Batman made his first appearance, in Detective Comics no. 27.

75 years ago, from 24th to 25th March 1944 that World War 2's 'Great Escape' took place. 76 Allied prisoners broke out of the Stalag Luft III prisoner-ofwar camp near Sagan, Germany after digging tunnels. 73 were recaptured and 50 executed. The event was dramatised in the classic film The Great Escape.

60 years ago, on  $9^{\text{th}}$  March 1959 that the Barbie doll was launched at the International Toy Fair in New York City, USA.

50 years ago, on 4th March 1969 that British gangsters Ronald and Reginald Kray (the Kray twins) were found guilty of murdering the criminals Jack McVitie ('Jack the Hat') and George Cornell. They were sentenced to life imprisonment.

40 years ago, on 26th March 1979 that The Camp David Peace Accord was sianed bv Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin and Egyptian President Anwar Sadat, ending 30 years of war.

30 years ago, on 12th March 1989 that Tim Berners-Lee invented the World Wide Webb while working at CERN.

25 years ago, on 12th March 1994 that the first women priests in the Church of England were ordained.






During Lent read through the Gospel of Luke and each day pray for God to help you become more like Jesus

# 25 years of ordaining women

25 years ago, on 12<sup>th</sup> March 1994, the first 32 women priests in the Church of England were ordained. It happened in Bristol Cathedral, and Bishop Barry Rogerson ordained them in alphabetical order; so Angela Berners-Wilson was considered the very first woman to be ordained. She is

now chaplain at the University of Bath and prebendary at Wells Cathedral. The youngest was Karen MacKinnon, now spiritual care manager at Southampton Hospital. Ten years later, one in five priests was a woman. Of the 542 candidates entering training this year, more than half (274) are women, which is 19 per cent more than last year.

# Washburn Parish Council


Washburn Parish Council covers the areas of Blubberhouses, Fewston, Norwood and Timble. The Parish Council is the first tier of local government and is a body of volunteers elected to represent the views of their community.

The Parish Council met in early January to agree the parish budget for the upcoming financial year. The Council agreed a parish precept of £7,500 for the year 2019-20. This precept will be used to ensure local maintenance works by our caretaker, upkeep of the Meagill Lane Chapel, and equipment maintenance at the Swinsty Moor Car Park defibrillator, as well as ensuring the Council meets its statutory obligations and responsibilities through the Parish Clerk.

In addition, Washburn Parish Council continues to report highways issues affecting the parish; monitor and comment on local planning applications or major proposals such as the A59 Kex Gill road realignment; and inform residents of activities and events in the parish on our noticeboards and website.

The next meeting of Washburn Parish Council will be held on Monday 4<sup>th</sup> March 2019 at Norwood Social Hall, commencing at 7.30pm.

# Askwith With Weston WI



We moved to temporary premises in February as the village hall was undergoing refurbishment. It was a tight fit in the dining room at the Askwith Arms but the landlord and landlady kindly let us use it and made us very welcome and, of course, WI members are famously adaptable!

Our speaker was Beth Hughes from By Betty Headwear and she brought along the most fabulous selection of hats for us to try. She began by saying that anyone can wear a hat but there are basic rules you should follow when choosing what's right for you. First, it must be in a colour that suits you, second think about the outfit you plan to wear it with, and third look at the shape of your face. Face shape governs the kind of hat that's right for you so for example if you're square jawed wear a hat with a soft brim and at an angle, longer face - a hat with a wide brim and a short crown, and round face - choose a wide brimmed hat with a taller crown and so on. She said the taller you are the bigger hat you can wear, but if you're short avoid large hats. Simple rules but not always obvious to many of us who only buy hats for special occasions and panic at the very thought of it.

She then went on to suggest hats for women who wear glasses or have long hair, very short hair or a fringe. All the while inviting members to come and try on the hats she suggested for them. There were lots of oohs and aahs! Beth explained the techniques of hat making and the various materials they are made from and how these materials affect the shaping

of the hat. She began her business by making fascinators and was mostly self-taught, although she did have some formal training later when she began to make more elaborate hats. She is clearly a very talented milliner and she ended her talk with a brief look at the embellishments she uses to enhance her hats such as feathers, veiling, ostrich quills, beads and jewels etc. It was a really absorbing and fun evening and as soon as Beth had finished everyone took the opportunity to try on as many hats as possible!

The following week on a beautiful sunny day a group of us went to Goldsborough Hall near Knaresborough to enjoy the hundreds of woodland snowdrops, aconites, and hellebores followed by a delicious cream tea in the orangery, and in March a number of us are visiting Bishop Monkton to hear Mark Gregory, designer of the Welcome to Yorkshire garden at last year's Chelsea, talk about his winning entry and his plans for his 2019 garden.

We're a very friendly group of women who meet on the second Thursday of the month, 7.30pm, at Askwith Village Hall. We have a lunch club and a walking group and welcome new members and visitors from all around the surrounding area. Our speakers on Thursday 14th March are Jacqui and Peter Morrell from HAPPY Hedgehog Rescue and we're hoping they may be able to bring along one or two of their rescued hedgehogs.
