## Remembering Diana, Princess of Wales

The funeral of Diana, Princess of Wales, took place in Westminster Abbey 20 years ago, on 6th September 1997.

Two thousand people attended the ceremony. The British TV audience peaked at 32.1 million, one of the highest viewing figures ever. Two billion people followed it worldwide, and the streets were lined with about two million people as the cortège travelled four miles through London.


The Princess's body was in a lead-lined coffin, and her pallbearers had to practice with two concrete kerb stones for the "ice-rink" journey along the aisle.

Buckingham Palace had just a week to organise the funeral. There was particular tension over who should walk behind the coffin, with the young Princes not keen. Prince Harry has said recently: "I don't think any child should be asked to do that."

The event was not a state funeral, but a royal ceremonial funeral with pageantry and Anglican funeral liturgy. The ceremony lasted one hour and ten minutes and was led by the Archbishop of Canterbury, George Carey, and the Dean of Westminster, Wesley Carr. During the service, Elton John sang Candle in the Wind, which had been re-written by lyricist Bernie Taupin in tribute to Diana.

After the ceremony in the Abbey, the Princess's body was buried in a private ceremony on an island within the grounds of Althorp Park, the Spencer family home.





### Siegfried Sassoon - war poet

One of the leading poets of the First World War, Siegfried Sassoon died 50 years ago, on 1st September 1967. His intense, dramatic verses highlighted the futility of war and attacked those who in his view sought to prolong it.


Sassoon was also known for his prose, particularly the semiautobiographical Memoirs of a Foxhunting Man and its sequels, published in the 1920s and 30s.

He was the product of a wealthy Kent family: his father was a notable Jewish merchant and his mother came from a family of artists and sculptors. He went to Marlborough School and Cambridge University but did not obtain a degree. He served with distinction in the First World War, earning the Military Cross in 1916 for bringing wounded soldiers to safety.

He was discharged after being injured but remained deeply affected by the horrors of war, writing the anti-war "Soldiers' Declaration" and flinging his MC into the Mersey – at least, that is what everyone thought, until it turned up at his ex-wife's former home on the Isle of Mull in 2007.

Instead of being court-martialed, he was sent to Craiglockhart Military Hospital in Edinburgh for treatment. Here he met Wilfred Owen, several years younger than him, who was inspired to write Great War poetry himself. He was killed a week before the war ended after returning unnecessarily to the front – despite Sassoon trying to prevent him from doing so.

In his later years Sassoon became a devout Roman Catholic, and his final poems reflected that.






Gabriel is best known for his appearing to a young Jewish girl named Mary to tell her that she will give birth to Jesus.

## Askwith With Weston WI Report



Last week we hosted Tea With the Girls, a lovely afternoon tea party in aid of Bloodwise, formerly Leukaemia and Lymphoma Research. The whole event was masterminded by Andrea, who's one of our members, and our WI simply provided the venue, the bunting, the tea, and of course plenty of delicious cakes. We were delighted that Angela and Chris, two of the original Calendar girls, were able to come along and join in the fun. The village hall was packed all afternoon and Andrea raised a wonderful amount of money for the charity so we were very happy to be of help.

Andrea was also our speaker at this month's meeting. She's a longstanding volunteer at the Open Arms Infant Homes in Malawi and gave a moving insight into its valuable work caring for orphaned babies and toddlers who would otherwise almost certainly die. Malawi is one of the poorest countries in the world, an estimated 74% of its population earn less than 1.25 dollars per day, and many women die in childbirth, either due to lack of medical facilities, poor diet, or health complications. This is why Open Arms exists, to take in orphaned and abandoned babies and provide love, shelter, food, and medical care, until such time as they can be returned to their extended families where possible and hopefully grow up healthy and strong. It was an extremely moving account of life in Malawi and was a salutory reminder of how lucky we are in the West.

Next week we're looking forward to visiting Menwith Hill and also our Federation have put together a Celebrating Yorkshire day at Hampsthwaite where we'll be treated to cookery demonstrations, talks from local food producers, and special guest Amanda Owen, the Yorkshire Shepherdess. So it should be an excellent day celebrating the best our county has to offer.

Otherwise, as usual we have our craft and walking groups, no lunch get together this month due to holidays, and, following last month's visit from Rigby and Peller, a group of us are going to their shop in Harrogate to see more of their fabulous underwear with maybe the odd glass of Prosecco thrown in !

## Acts for Everyone - what gives us courage?

'Unschooled, ordinary men' (Acts 4:13). That is how Peter and John were described by the authorities, having healed the cripple man at the Beautiful Gate. They were disturbed that the apostles were proclaiming that Jesus was alive and healing in His name. Their aim was the silence Peter and John (4:17), but they refused! What gave them the courage to stand for Jesus and how can we learn from this ourselves?

The authorities could not argue against the evidence of a changed life. The crippled man stood before them completely healed for the first time in 40 years (10). A powerful apologetic for the Christian Faith is the testimony of a changed life, for the authorities could say nothing (14). The story of our faith journey may not be as dramatic, but God can use it powerfully.

Peter also points to the authority of Jesus Christ, as the only name under heaven by which we can be saved (12). By raising Jesus the dead, God marked him out as uniquely the Lord and Saviour of mankind. Christianity is not just another variety of religious experience, but a life changing relationship with Jesus, to which we can point others.

Finally, we are told that Peter is filled with the Spirit (8), as on the Day of Pentecost. The Spirit will give us the words and authority to speak and act in the name of Jesus. He enables to communicate the message in a way that people can understand and respond to.

The authorities were alarmed by the growth of the Church. However, they could not stop the apostles from talking about what they had seen and heard (4:20). It is still true today that Christianity will only grow when it talks; stop it talking and you stop it growing!



## All in the month of September

It was:

300 years ago: on 24th Sept 1717 that Horace Walpole, 4th Earl of Orford, son of Prime Minister Robert Walpole, was born. Known for The Castle of Otranto, regarded as the first Gothic novel. He also built Strawberry Hill House in Twickenham, which started the Gothic revival in architecture.

250 years ago: on 4th Sept 1767 that Charles Townshend, British politician, died. Chancellor of the Exchequer (1766-67) whose taxation of imports into the British colonies in North America led to the American Revolution.

150 years ago: on 4th Sept 1867 that Sheffield Wednesday Football Club was founded.

100 years ago: on 27th Sept 1917 that Edgar Degas, French Impressionist artist and sculptor died.

80 years ago: on 21st Sept 1937 that J R R Tolkien's novel The Hobbit was published.

75 years ago: on 21st Sept 1942 that the Boeing B-29 Superfortress bomber made its first flight.

70 years ago: on 8th Sept 1947 that the Treaty of Dunkirk came into effect. It was a Treaty of Alliance and Mutual Assistance between Britain and France against a possible attack from Germany following WWI

65 years ago: on 6th Sep 1952 that the Farnborough Air Crash took place in Hampshire. A de Havilland fighter jet broke apart and fell into the crowd, killing 31 people.

60 years ago: on 4th Sept 1957 that the Wolfenden Report was published in Britain. It recommended that homosexual behavior between consenting adults in private should no longer be a criminal offence. (Homosexuality was decriminalized in England and Wales in 1967, in Scotland in 1980 and in Northern Ireland in 1982.)

50 years ago: on 1st Sept 1967 that Siegfried Sassoon, British poet, writer and soldier, died. He was one of the leading poets of WW1, particularly known for his anti-war poetry and autobiographical works. Also 50 years ago: on 30th Sept 1967 that the BBC reorganized its radio network. BBC Radio 1 was launched; the BBC Light Programme became BBC Radio 2; the BBC Third Programme and BBC Music Programme were merged and became Radio 3; and the BBC Home Service became Radio 4.

40 years ago: on 18th Sept 1977 that NASA's Voyager 1 spacecraft sent back the first-ever photograph of the Earth and Moon together in a single image.

25 years ago: on 16th Sept 1992 that the Black Wednesday sterling crisis took place. Britain crashed out of the European Exchange Rate Mechanism (ERM), raised interest rates from 10% to 15%, and spent billions of pounds buying up sterling that was being frantically disposed of on international financial markets.

20 years ago: on 1st Sept 1997 that French investigators revealed that Henri Paul, the driver of the car in which Princess Diana was fatally injured, had been nearly three times over the French drink-drive limit and had also been speeding.

Also 20 years ago: on 5th Sept 1997 that Mother Teresa of Calcutta died. She was a Macedonian-born Albanian Indian nun and humanitarian. She founded the Missionaries of Charity and was winner of the 1979 Nobel Peace Prize. Beatified October 2003.

Also 20 years ago: on 6th Sept 1997 that the funeral of Diana, Princess of Wales, took place in Westminster Abbey, London.

Also 20 years ago: on 29th Sept 1997 that scientists announced they had established a link between BSE (mad cow disease) and the human brain disease vCJD.

15 years ago: on 6th Sept 2002 that the US Congress convened in New York City to honor victims of the 9/11 terrorist attacks of 2001. It was the first time Congress had convened outside Washington DC since 1790.

10 years ago: on 29th Sept 2007 that the world's first commercial nuclear power station, Calder Hall in Cumbria, was demolished. It operated from 1956 to 2003.
