

# Words fail me ...

n the 1960s, a group of young musicians from Liverpool were celebrated as "The Fab Four". "Fab" being short for fabulous. But they belonged to no fable: they were real. For as long as I can remember, "terrific" has had nothing to do with terror or "fantastic" with fantasy. Now, in recent years, "incredible" no longer means "cannot be believed" but stands for amazing or exceptional.

Those are just four examples of how words become de-valued in our lazy attempts to give what we say a greater effect. "Christmas" has suffered in a similar way but for different reasons. It has already been much in use since Autumn began. Of course, "Christmas" has long been a convenient and attractive 'hook' to hang things for sale onto. It also fits a special kind of social gathering held before the end of the year as Winter begins .... Convenient, but robbing of value. From a Christian point of view, anyway.

In our current Church Service book, "Christmas" first appears attached to 24th December, Christmas Eve. This year, as dose as 23rd December is the 4th (last) Sunday of the Advent Season. In the 1662 Book of Common Prayer, that Sunday is followed helpfully by the heading, "The Nativity of Our Lord, or the Birth-Day of Christ commonly called Christmas Day", printed above the prayer and Bible readings. And there you have it. Christmas celebrates the Birth of Jesus our Saviour.

In Common Worship, the Collect (special prayer) set for Christmas Eve begins, "Almighty God, you make us glad with the yearly remembrance of the birth of your Son Jesus Christ ..." With so much of the C -word all around us (and including us) it may be hard to remember the reason for the Season. I'm not complaining: it's the way of the world with words. (And the Post Office would hardly be grateful if everyone posted their cards to arrive on Christmas Eve!) Maybe also there is an element of "official birthday" about 25th December. It's just 9 months after we celebrate Angel Gabriel's visit to the Blessed Virgin Mary, of course. But nobody involved was holding a calendar on that day either, I'm sure. Wherever in the world, at whatever season the Feast is the same birthday of Jesus, God's greatest gift to us. And how much we need Jesus as Prince of Peace right now!



We Will Remember Them.....

hey were remembered in thought, words and deeds by people in the Washburn Valley and many visitors.

St Michael and St Lawrence church with the stunning cascade of poppies and flowers hosted The Centenary Commemoration of WW1 Armistice with a concert two choirs. Pinsuti Chamber Choir Washburn Valley Choir. The and contrasting music representing the evocative music of composers influenced by the devastating effects of WW1. Works by Ralph Vaughan Williams, Elgar, Parry, Faure contributed to the challenging programme for the singers.

With a full house of 124 people, choirs of 40 singers the final singing of Jerusalem raised the roof, a very local response to the national mood of

national mood Remembrance.

Over 35 people, mainly ladies of course, contributed to the poppy cascade – sincere thanks to all of them for their motivation and remembrance.

Local men lost in the war are remembered individually with pictures carefullv archived and words in the Washburn Heritage Centre. Archivists have worked diligently to produce this exhibition which contributes to the War and the Washburn Valley programme at the Washburn Heritage Centre. Visitors to the Centre, and the Church have appreciated the exhibition, and the diverse events of programme. Walks, the talks and suppers reflecting

historical and current aspects of military involvement in our locality and wider society are included.

Finally, in response to the national appeal to commemorate 1400 bell ringers who died in WW1, the bells were rung at Fewston, half muffled out of respect for the dead, with rounds, call changes and Cloisters. On 11 November at 19.05, to link with the lighting of bonfires across the nation, bell ringers were asked to ring – the bells were rung at St Andrew's, Blubberhouses.

**They were remembered** and those who continue to serve and sustain injuries and death will be helped by donations of £450 to Combat Stress and £450 to Help for Heroes.

## Thank you to everyone who contributed, and made us all remember.





For those of us about to spend Christmas with a new child or grandchild, we will know how very special the arrival of a baby is! This Christmas we celebrate again God's gift of Jesus: '*Thanks be to God for His indescribable gift!*' (2 Corinthians 9:15). What can we say about this baby?

## He is God Himself:

The unthinkable has happened: God has become a human being! The eternal, creator God enters the world of time and space, both fully human and fully divine. This divine baby can bring hope to our messy world, because He has fully become part of it. He doesn't stand apart, but demonstrates a commitment to be with us and on our side in the midst of sin and suffering.

*He is human like us:* Jesus fully engaged with the jungle of human experience. By His cross and resurrection, He can release us from the power of wrong, hurt and shame to secure for us a life of love, peace and forgiveness. Remember, the crib and cross are made of the same wood!

## He is one with us:

In the coming of Jesus, God doesn't draw us simply into a cosmic event, but into a relationship. Just as you or I can hold and hug our children and grandchildren, so we have a God who wants to be intimately involved in our lives. As Emmanuel, 'God is with us' (Matt 1:23). Therefore, the question is: Are we with Him? Are we ready to make space for Him at the centre of our Christmas Celebrations this year?

'At Christmas time, when we receive presents we don't really need, God offers us a gift we cannot do without.' (J John).



'Therefore the Lord Himself will give you a sign: the virgin will conceive and give birth to a son, and will call Him Immanuel.' (Isaiah 7:14)

This promise to King Ahaz in eighth century Judah is fulfilled in the coming of Jesus at the first Christmas (Matthew 1:23). However, the promise of 'God with Us' is as relevant to Ahaz, as it is to us today. He was facing the military threat of Syria and Israel invading his country and Isaiah calls upon him not to panic or be afraid, but to trust in God, who is in control of the situation.

For us, Christmas often highlights the difficulties that we face in our lives, e.g. the stress of preparing and entertaining family and friends; the financial pressures of putting on a good Christmas; a time when we find ourselves alone or facing our first Christmas without a loved one. The message of Immanuel is the same for us! We don't need to panic or be afraid, because the baby born in Bethlehem reminds us that God really does care:

God is for me and with me: He is on my side and by my side. He's not against me and I am never alone.

God is for me: everything will work out according to His plan. My life isn't just a series of random events or mistakes.

God is with me: when others show they are not, by what they think or do.

God is with me: circumstances may change, but God will strengthen me in the midst of them all.

God is with me: He isn't far away but had made the journey into my world. This is the heart of the Christmas message, once we get past the trees, gifts, turkey stuffing and pudding!





# All In The Month Of December

t was 200 years ago, on 24<sup>th</sup> December 1818 that the popular Christmas carol 'Silent Night' was performed for the first time, at midnight mass at a parish church in Oberndorf bei Salzburg, Austria. It had been written just a few hours earlier by teacher and church organist Franz Xaver Gruber, to lyrics by priest Joseph Mohr. (The lyrics were actually a poem Mohr had written two years earlier.)

175 years ago, on 19<sup>th</sup> December 1843 that Charles Dickens' novella *A Christmas Carol* was first published.

150 years ago, on 9<sup>th</sup> December 1868 that Franz Haber, Polish-born German chemist was born. He was winner of the 1918 Nobel Prize for Chemistry for developing synthetic ammonia. He was known as the 'father of chemical warfare' for his work on poisonous gases during World War 1.

100 years ago, on 14<sup>th</sup> December that the historic British general election of 1918 took place. It was the first time that women (over 30) and all men (over 21) were eligible to vote. Lloyd George's Liberal coalition was re-elected.

75 years ago, on 22<sup>nd</sup> December 1943 that Beatrix Potter, the children's writer and illustrator, died. She had created animal characters such as Peter Rabbit, Squirrel Nutkin, Mrs Tiggy-Winkle, Jemima Puddle-Duck and many more.

70 years ago, on 19<sup>th</sup> December 1948 that the Universal Declaration of Human Rights was adopted by the United Nations General Assembly.

60 years ago, on  $5^{th}$  December 1958 that Britain's first motorway, the Preston By-Pass, was opened. It is now a part of the M6 motorway.

30 years ago, on  $21^{st}$  December 1988 that a Pan Am jet exploded and crashed onto the Scottish town of Lockerbie, killing 259 passengers and crew and 11 people on the ground. The bomb had been planted by Libyan terrorists.

20 years ago, from 16-19<sup>th</sup> December that Operation Desert Fox took place. US and British forces launched a major four-day series of sustained air-strikes against Iraq after Iraqi President Saddam Hussein refused to cooperate with UN weapons inspectors.

10 years ago, on 19<sup>th</sup> December 2008 that during the 2008 Financial Crisis President George W. Bush approved a \$17.4 billion loans package to rescue the troubled car manufacturers General Motors and Chrysler.
