

Dedicated followers of fashion tell us fashion styles invariably repeat themselves, and if you keep something long enough, like an item of clothing, it can become fashionable again years later, whether they be summer clothes or winter clothes. Ladies will know something about this?

Solomon said 3000 yrs ago:

What has been will be again

What has been done will be done again

There is nothing new under the sun (Ecclesiastes 1:3)

Similarly, what we feel like, and the things we have been accustomed to, we often like to repeat. Most people like the sun. Summer, and the sun, brings about the 'feel good' factor, our endorphins tell us, also lighter and longer days. It is in the summer, holiday makers and people invariably want to search and seek and get out 'under the sun,' perhaps on a beach, in the garden.etc... 'What has been will be again: There is nothing new under the sun.'

As this is the season most people again like to take their holidays, it's good to remember that the word 'holiday' is derived from "holy day." And it was Christians who pressed employers for workers paid holidays towards the end of the nineteenth and beginning of the twentieth centuries

as an annual requirement for our well being.

The sun provides us with so much light, and food, for our day to day existence. For Christians there is also another 'Son,' namely Jesus who provides them with 'light' and 'food' for their present sustenance and eternal existence. (" I am the light of the World " John 8:12...and, we "do not life by bread alone" Matt 4:4). "Sun of righteousness" (Malachi 4.2), is Jesus, the 'Son of righteousness,' who also provides believers with their everlasting garments or robes of righteousness (Isa 61:10, Rev 19:8), for a covering for our sins. And when you have anything that is 'everlasting' or 'eternal' it can never be out of fashion! -It's the same but different.

So this summer let Jesus shine in our hearts as the 'Sun of righteousness' knowing that the garments He provides are never out of fashion, and despite whatever we feel like, or what our endorphins tell us, "Jesus is the same, yesterday, today and forever (Hebrews 13.8)."

advantage; we sing a mix of A Cappella and accompanied music, some Ancient, some Modern and some "In Between"?!



Washburn Parish Council

The Council recently held its Annual Parish meeting where the end of year report was presented by the Chair of the Council. Cllr Christine Ryder outlined that the Council has employed the Parish caretaker to undertake essential maintenance, repair the vandalised viewfinder over-looking Swinsty Reservoir, carried out grass cutting around the parish and organised a litter pick which led to 57 bags of rubbish being collected in difficult weather conditions. The Council would like to thank everyone who took part. The Council has also been making representations with regards to the A59 Kex Gill realignment and the Billy Lane public rights of way application. The Council has invested in its website and continue to report highway issues and comment on planning applications.

The Annual Council meeting commenced with the election of Cllr Graham Hebblethwaite as the new Chair of the Council and the re-election of Vice Chair Cllr Jacqueline Davison. The out-going Chair Cllr Christine Ryder was thanked by all councillors for her work during the previous seven years as Chair and welcomed her continued contribution to the Council in the future.

The Council resolved to adopt new policies in relation to the effective working of the Council and agreed the annual governance and accounting statements to be audited.

The Council welcomed the news that the repair on the A59 Kex Gill was complete and the road reopened.

The Council resolved to submit a statement of case with regards to the Billy Lane Local Inquiry and Cllr Andrew Campbell will represent the Council at the upcoming Inquiry in August.

A series of highways issues and maintenance requirements were identified by councillors and will be reported.

The next meeting of Washburn Parish Council will be held on Monday 1st July 2019 at the Robinson Library in Timble. Commencing at 7.30pm. Should you wish to contact any of your councillors please email washburnpc@gmail.com

All in the Month of July

It was,

200 years ago, on 2nd July 1819 that the Cotton Mills and Factories Act 1819 was passed in Britain. It placed restrictions on the number of hours children could work in cotton mills. It was virtually unenforceable and had little effect, but it paved the way for later legislation.

175 years ago, on 22nd July 1844 that William Archibald Spooner, British clergyman and educator, was born. Known for his absent-mindedness, he often accidentally mixed up the syllables of words, to comic effect. These are now known as spoonerisms.

Also 175 years ago, on 28th July 1844 that Gerard Manley Hopkins, British poet and Jesuit priest, was born.

100 years ago, on 20th July 1919 that Sir Edmund Hillary was born. This New Zealand mountaineer and Antarctic explorer, along with the Sherpa mountaineer Tenzing Norgay, were the first two people to conquer Mount Everest. (Died 2008.)

90 years ago, on 3rd July 1929 that foam rubber was invented by British scientist E.A. Murphy at Dunlop Latex Development Laboratories.

80 years ago, on 9th July 1939 that Winston Churchill urged the governments of Britain and France to form a military alliance with the Soviet Union. 75 years ago, on 20th July 1944 that the July plot took place. The German Resistance movement attempted to assassinate Adolf Hitler in Berlin and remove the Nazi Party from power in a coup. The attempt failed, and the movement's central figure, Claus von Stauffenberg, was executed the following day.

65 years ago, on 5th July 1954 that the BBC launched the first daily TV news programme in the UK.

50 years ago, on 1st July 1969 that Prince Charles was invested as the Prince of Wales.

Also 50 years ago, on 21st July 1969 that the American astronauts Neil Armstrong and Edwin 'Buzz' Aldrin became the first people to walk on the surface of the Moon.

25 years ago, on 21st July 1994 that Tony Blair was elected leader of Britain's Labour Party. He became Prime Minister in 1997.

20 years ago, on 1st July 1999 that the Scottish Parliament was officially opened.

10 years ago, on 31st July 2009 that Sir Bobby Robson, British footballer and manager, died. He played for, and managed, several teams, and managed the England national team between 1982 and 1990.
