

All in the month of August

It was:

250 years ago, on 22nd August 1770 that British explorer Captain James Cook discovered eastern Australia, named it New South Wales, and claimed it for Britain.

150 years ago, on 4th August 1870 that the British Red Cross Society was founded.

125 years ago, on 10th August 1895 that the Proms (Promenade Concerts) held in the Albert Hall began in London.

100 years ago, on 21st August 1920 that Christopher Robin Milne was born. He was son of the author A. A. Milne, and he appeared as a character in his father's Winnie-the-Pooh stories about his toys (Died 1996.)

90 years ago, from 16th to 23rd August 1930 that the first British Empire Games (now the Commonwealth Games) were held in Hamilton, Ontario, Canada.

80 years ago, on 13th August 1940 that the main phase of the Battle of Britain began. The German Luftwaffe launched raids on RAF airfields and radar installations. On 29th August Winston Churchill paid tribute to the Royal Air Force in a famous House of Commons speech, saying, "Never in the field of human conflict was so much owed by so many to so few."

75 years ago, on 6th August 1945 that the US Army Air Forces dropped an atomic bomb on the city of Hiroshima, Japan. The centre of the city was totally destroyed, and 80,000 people were killed immediately. A further 60,000 died by the end of the year. It was the first city in history to be hit by a nuclear weapon.

Also 75 years ago, on 9th August 1945 that the US Army Air Forces dropped an atomic bomb on the city of Nagasaki, Japan. 40,000 people died immediately and about 33,000 more by the end of the year. It was the second (and last) city to experience a nuclear attack.

70 years ago, on 15th August 1950 that Princess Anne, the Princess Royal, was born. She is the only daughter of Queen Elizabeth II and Prince Philip.

60 years ago, on 8th August 1960 that the pop song *Itsy Bitsy Teenie Weenie* Yellow Polkadot Bikini by Brian Hyland became a worldwide hit. The record had been released in June.

40 years ago, on 14th August 1980 that Lech Walesa led a strike by shipyard


workers in Gdansk, Poland, to protest against the dismissal of a trade union activist. On 30th August the striking workers won the right to establish independent trade unions. This led to the formation of the Solidarity movement.

30 years ago, from 2nd August 1990 to 28th February 1991 the Gulf War took place. On 2nd August Irag invaded Kuwait. The United Nations Security Council then ordered a global trade embargo against Irag. On 7th August the USA launched Operation Desert Shield, and then Operation Desert Storm, to prevent Iraq from invading Saudi Arabia. Coalition victory.

20 years ago, on 5th August 2000 that Sir Alec Guinness, British stage and film actor (Taking the lead role in BBC's *Tinker, Tailor Soldier Spy* playing George Smilie he was stared in The Bridge on the River Kwai, Lawrence of Arabia, Doctor Zhivago, A Passage to India, Star Wars, and much more) died.

15 years ago, from 23rd to 31st August, Hurricane Katrina hit the Bahamas, Cuba and the southern US states. New Orleans was badly affected when the levee system failed, and 80% of the city was under water for weeks. Florida and Mississippi were also badly hit. More than 1,800 people died. It was the costliest natural disaster in US history.

10 years ago, on 5th August 2010 a cave-in at the San Jose copper and gold mine near Copiapo in northern Chile trapped 33 workers 700 metres underground. An international rescue operation was launched, and they were brought to the surface on 13th October after being trapped for 69 days. Around one billion people watched the rescue on TV.





Mid Wharfedale Parish Council

Due to the Covid19 pandemic the Government changed legislation to enable councils to hold meetings electronically. MWPC therefore had a Zoom meeting on 21st May 2020 starting at 7.45pm. This was the Annual meeting incorporating an Ordinary meeting.

All parishes were represented along with Cllr Stanley from NYCC and Cllr Oldham from HBC.

Cllr Crossley of Weston and Cllr Shepherd were both voted on as Chairman and Vice Chairman.

Minutes of the Meeting held on 20th February 2020 having been circulated were proposed by Cllr Marston and resolved as a correct record and then signed remotely by the Chairman.

Cllr Shepherd on behalf of Askwith resident Julian Scott asked for information on how Askwith School was going to protect the villagers with the self distancing of 2m when the school reopens in June. Some discussion took place with the clerk asked to write to the school asking for details for the self distancing measures and their risk assessment policy.

Highway matters from the last meeting were discussed, with all the items to be done agreed by NYCC, but unfortunately none of these items had yet been completed.

Due to the Government changing legislation to allow Council meetings to be attended electronically the

MWPC Standing Orders were updated.

Cllr Marston requested that as previously agreed the grass verges would be cut throughout the parish, this is weather dependent and how much the grass grows. Verge areas to be cut were agreed. The accounts for 2019/20 were presented. It was resolved to accept the Annual Governance Statement. An internal audit had been undertaken and as there were no issues from this and the accounts were adopted.

Accounts for the last 3 months were dealt with and planning applications discussed

Cllr Lumley gave an update on NYCC and Cllr Oldham gave an update on HBC.

Cllr Powell asked why trailers were not allowed at the NYCC recycling centers. Cllr Lumley said this was due to transport logistics and the social distancing requirements. When these were relaxed then trailers would be allowed back into the recycling centers.

The next meeting is 20th August 2020 and it is hoped that this will be at Askwith Village Hall starting at 7.45pm. Should the lockdown still be an issue and a meeting is held electronically then how the general public can attend will be listed on the meeting agenda.

The Birds in Your Garden



Finches

Finch numbers in my garden seem to have reduced significantly over the last few years. This in itself is not unusual, as bird populations move around, and feeding preferences change. But, reading various BTO publications and emails made me realise that I am not alone. Greenfinches have been scarce for a while, but Chaffinch numbers have more recently plummeted too. They are still around, I can hear them, but I don't see many on my feeders.

More widely, volunteer data have highlighted the developing Chaffinch population crisis. Longterm trends show not only that Chaffinch numbers are in steep decline, but also that these changes vary between UK regions. Does this mean Chaffinches are facing different pressures in different places? Why did Chaffinch numbers only start to decrease dramatically in 2012, and not when the trichomonosis outbreak

There used to be 6 million plus chaffinches in the U.K., so their numbers are not a cause for concern just yet, though we can't afford to allow the decrease to continue.

We know that Chaffinch populations were hit in

2006 by the outbreak of trichomonosis, with a decline of 20% in some regions. Things seemed to improve after a couple of years but then there was another decline. Was this trichomonosis reappearing or was there more to it?

Disease apart, there are many reasons why finches, particularly chaffinches, have been in trouble, most being manmade problems, which affect many birds' food sources and habitat, particularly songbirds.

Agriculture has been changing constantly in response to multiple pressures to increase production and reduce costs. Inevitably such changes will affect the environment and everincreasing efforts will be needed to minimise their impact.

The issues are multiple, and farmers' responses are equally varied. For example, field margins, valuable corridors for much wildlife, are under constant pressure; autumn sowing plus the virtual elimination of crop rotation, leaves neither stubble nor fallow periods between crops, and removes a vital resource for over-wintering birds. All these changes reduce the food supply.

A less obvious aspect of the specialisation which is being forced on farmers is that farms are now either arable or livestock, rarely both, resulting in a loss of the diverse habitats upon which many birds depended for survival. They used to transfer from one to another as the seasons progressed.

Less controversial, but still important: increased efficiency in harvesting means less cereal spilt or left in fields; a larder which used to keep birds fed for many weeks. More effective and secure food storage also means birds can't access grain stores or spills anymore!

Sadly, the chaffinch is not just susceptible to Trichomonosis, but also to leg lesions, commonly known as 'scaly leg' or 'tassel foot, caused by Papillomavirus virus or Cnemidocoptes mites. Neither is particularly harmful, but it does leave them with uncomfortable and unsightly growths on their feet and legs, and can make them more vulnerable to predators.

Climate change complicates matters too. Species that rely on each other in the food chain are changing the timing of phases within their life cycles; plants are budding earlier and the invertebrates upon which woodland passerines, including chaffinches, rely, appear at a different time of the year, causing phenological mismatch, (Phenology is the study of cyclic and seasonal natural phenomena, especially in relation to climate, plant and animal life.) i.e. things are happening at the wrong time of the year.

These are complicated, gradual processes; most small birds rely on a seasonal abundance of bugs and buds, and things are changing.

Maybe you are lucky and see Chaffinches regularly; here's hoping for a change in their fortunes.
