

The phone call came 'out of the blue' but was welcome, nevertheless. Charlotte was told that she was now top of the waiting list for her operation and that it would happen 'sometime in December.' Like so many people in our country today Charlotte has been on a waiting list for an operation for about two years. In the early days we wondered each month if she would hear some news and then as the months passed, we more or less forgot about it. Charlotte adapted her life and so when the news came it took us by surprise. Now we just have to wait for the exact date in December to be revealed so we can plan in a bit more detail. Due to COVID all of us in the Vicarage will have to isolate for a few days before her operation and December isn't the best month for a priest to do that.

Most of December is also Advent, the time in the Church year when we anticipate Christmas. During Advent we remember how God's people waited for the coming of the Messiah, of Jesus, throughout all the long centuries of darkness before the great light that came to earth on that first Christmas. As we remember their wait we also anticipate the great feast of Christmas; even though we know exactly when it will be!

All through this month of December each of us will be making our own preparations for Christmas Day. Presents, food, cards, singing Carols either in Church or in the shower, reading the story of the first Christmas, attending school Nativity plays or the Christmas services in the Benefice. Whatever we do we cannot but help to get excited. All of us are touched in some way by the magic of Christmas however we will spend it. For some it will be a great family affair, for others it will be far quieter. But wherever we find ourselves on the 25<sup>th</sup> of December remember this. This day tells us that each of us is loved by God, loved so much that he gave us the greatest gift that anyone could ever imagine, his own Son, Jesus, the baby in the stable at Bethlehem. Jesus, the reason for this season of Joy and good will.

So rejoice that you are loved and share that love with all you meet during this most blessed time of the year. May you have a blessed and a happy Christmas. With my love and prayers

# News from Norwood Chapel

Dear Friends,

The prophet Isaiah wrote, "For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace." (Isaiah 9:6) This reading is one filled with hope for the future for the people called Israel who are scattered during the Babylonian exile. This hope is grounded in the newborn child who will grow into a ruler and offer Godly counsel, strength, power, compassion and peace to the people. Even though Isaiah wrote these words hundreds of years before the birth of Christ, this reading is understood to be about Christ, the long-awaited Messiah, the Anointed One.

I think this reading still gives hope to us today. As we prepare to celebrate the birth of Christ at Christmas in our homes and churches, we can anticipate anew the birth of this royal son of David and how he makes a difference in our lives and in the lives of others. As we look at our society, we readily see how it is still in need of the things that Christ offers: acceptance, love, mercy, justice, forgiveness, hope, peace and joy. I don't think we'll ever outgrow our need for these gifts and neither will the church. Our Lord is ever-so generous and will continue to give these things to us; may we put them on our wish lists! Perhaps they can't be wrapped up and placed under the tree, but they can still be given and received, can't they?!

Have a good think . . . from this list, what do you need most this Christmas? (acceptance, love, mercy, justice, forgiveness, hope, peace and joy) What does your church need most? Your family and friends? Your community?

I encourage you to pray for these things asking God to give you and others what is most needed through the gift of his Son. Don't be surprised if God asks you to be part of the answer to your own prayers! You might be needed to share God's love and peace with those who are having a bad day. You might be needed to welcome people who don't normally attend your church for the special Christmas eservices. You might be needed to offer hope to someone who is struggling. You services. You might be needed to offer hope to someone who is struggling. You might need to forgive yourself so that you can forgive others. There is no brokenness that the fullness of God's love can't heal. The birth of Christ has the great potential to transform us and bring about newness of life. May we allow his birth to change us in ways that fill us with more humility, understanding and compassion.

Let us rejoice in the One who is coming again as the gift and the gift-giver! May you and your family have a very blessed Christmas!

What do the following have in common: using a defibrillator, Yorkshire cookery, local history and caring for hedgehogs? Yes, they're all part of Farnley Estate WI's 2022 programme. Look out for it on local noticeboards towards the end of the year or come to Leathley Village Hall at 7.30 on Wednesday 8 December for Poems and Prose by Candlelight or 12 January for a hands-on first aid session. We are always pleased to welcome visitors. Former members might be pleasantly surprised if they return.

The WI has local roots and a national presence. It provides an opportunity for all women to meet, to take part in activities and above all to be themselves. It's a way to socialise without having children at school, belonging to a church or playing a sport. Our local membership in-

# Bee Together St Andrews Church, Blubberhouses

With the advice of Bee Together Officer, Catherine Mercer, on 7 October 2021, a 'pollinator patch' has been created in the grounds of the church – over and around the area of the trench arch drain for the new toilet. An ideal area of disturbed turfs for the sowing of wildflower seeds. In many summers to come, a wildflower patch for the enjoyment of members of the congregation, public, and wildlife.

In future years once the area is established, YDMT may seek permission for seed to be collected and used for other meadows projects locally. In this way it is hoped that the legacy of this project may endure so that wildflower habitats across the area are

helped to safeguard the future of hay meadow species and reduce biodiversity loss.

Fewston and Blubberhouses Churches and Friends of Blubberhouses Churches will follow the recommendations for future management of this area, years 1 to 10. The site handbook is available in church with species list. The Bee Together project covers the Washburn Valley, supported by YDMT and Yorkshire Water.





# All in the month of December

It was:

1500 years ago, on 7<sup>th</sup> December 521 that St Columba, Irish missionary who spread Christianity in Scotland, was born. He was one of the Twelve Apostles of Ireland.

230 years ago on December 5, 1791, Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart died age 35 in Vienna, Austria. He had become seriously ill and rapidly declined, leading to speculation that he had been poisoned, this was later proven false. During his brief life, he created over 600 musical compositions and is widely considered one of the finest composers who ever lived.

250 years ago, on Christmas Day in Cockermouth, Cumberland 1771 that Dorothy Wordsworth, author writer, poet, and diarist, was born. on Christmas Day She was sister to the poet William Wordsworth. She took notes on her walks and these notes often inspired her brothers poems.

175 years ago, on 21 December 1846 that the first surgical operation in Europe using anaesthesia took place. Robert Liston amputated a servant's leg at University College Hospital in London.

150 years ago, on 24<sup>th</sup> December 1871 that the world premiere of Giuseppe Verdi's opera *Aida*, was held in Cairo, Egypt.

100 years ago, on 6<sup>th</sup> Dec 1921 that the Anglo-Irish Treaty was signed in London. It ended the Irish War of Independence and established the Irish Free State (with effect from December 1922.)

80 years ago, on 7<sup>th</sup> December 1941

that the Japanese made their surprise bomb attack on Pearl Harbour, Hawaii. The USA, UK, Netherlands, New Zealand, and other countries declared war on Japan the following day. The War in Europe had now become a World War.

75 years ago, on 18<sup>th</sup> December 1946, that Steve Biko, South Africa antiapartheid activist, was born. Founder of the Black Consciousness Movement, he was beaten to death by state security officers in 1977, aged 30. 60 years ago, on 4<sup>th</sup> December 1961, that birth control pills became available on the NHS.


50 years ago, from 3<sup>rd</sup> to 16<sup>th</sup> December 1971, that the Indo-Pakistani War took place. It was one of the shortest wars in history, but still between one and three million Bangladeshis were killed. Indian victory leading to the founding of Bangladesh.

30 years ago, on 25<sup>th</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup> December 1991, that Mikhail Gorbachev resigned as President of the Soviet Union, and the next day the Soviet Union was officially dissolved. The 12 remaining Soviet republics became independent states.

25 years ago, on 10<sup>th</sup> December 1996, that South African President Nelson Mandela signed a new constitution, completing the transition from white minority rule to full democracy.

Also 20 years ago, on 13<sup>th</sup> December 2001, that the Pentagon released a videotape of al-Qaeda leader Osama bin Laden, in which he stated that the deaths and destruction achieved by the 9/11 attacks had exceeded his most optimistic expectations.







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

## The Birds in Your Garden



# Jaus and acorns

A phone call last week induced me to have a closer look this year's acorn crop. My main chance to see any number of oak trees close to is on the golf course, and judging by the number of squirrels looking for acorns and apparently caching them, (whilst dodging golf balls – the safest place for them being, of course, on the fairway!) I had assumed the crop to be pretty good. However, having done a bit of reading and asking around it seems that there is more to it, and in reality, the crop is rather poor.

We had a bumper acorn crop last year, an event which is generally followed by a poor one, as the trees have used up most of their resources. Which means that it is likely that the larger than usual number of Jays and squirrels currently seen is a combination of two factors. Last year's glut of food increased survival rates, whilst this year's less bountiful harvest is forcing them to compete harder to find enough food to cache. If this is true, it will be interesting to see how Jays, which rely on the acorn crop more than most, get on over the winter. We may well see more of them on our feeders, particularly in rural or semi-rural areas. Although a wary species, individual Jays can be emboldened by hunger and may become surprisingly approachable when they visit gardens.

The spring months are important for the development of most trees and shrubs. It is when the buds burst, the leaves grow, and the flowers bloom. Oak trees usually flower between the end of April and mid-May, but as their

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flowers are wind pollinated, the wet weather we had last spring will have impeded pollination, and yet further reduced the acorn crop this year.

It is in autumn that Jays are at their most conspicuous in most years, hunting on the ground for the acorns which are their staple food. They can be seen collecting them, and can carry three or four in an adapted gullet plus one more held in their bills, taking them away from the immediate vicinity of the tree under which they found them, to be cached, typically in a hole that they have made in the ground with their beaks. In many years their numbers are increased by the arrival of birds from the near continent.

Jays appear to be able to relocate quite a lot of the acorns they have stored, some will be found by other birds or animals, including other corvids which have been seen watching the caching process and then raiding the store as soon as the cacher departs. Of the remainder, some will germinate to form seedlings, a good source of food for grazing animals. with those hidden in thorny patches being protected and able to grow into trees. It is this action of burying acorns away from the tree under which they found them that makes Jays, along with squirrels, such effective dispersal agents for the seeds, helping oak woodland to establish in new areas. Other corvids do behave in the same way, though to a lesser extent

This close cooperation has, over millennia, been vital for the oak tree since, when growing closely together, the dense canopy formed prevents

saplings from establishing themselves, so some form of dispersal is vital.

Squirrels, having a rather more varied diet might not fare so badly, as other nut bearing trees, such as horse chestnuts, are available for them. Time will tell, but this sort of weather variability is only going to become more common as climate change makes what are now extremes much more common.

Will we see more Jays in our gardens this winter

# Gardeners Corner





Now is the time to plant deciduous trees and shrubs and bare rooted fruit trees, just as long the ground is not frozen or waterlogged. Then you can come inside and put your feet up while you order seeds from the catalogues. Try and choose those that are disease resistant to avoid the use of chemicals in the garden.

Once indoors make sure that your potted cyclamen are positioned in a cool room with good light and remember to deadhead them regularly to encourage more flowers, removing any yellowing leaves as well. Cyclamen should only be watered once the soil begins to feel dry and always from below, letting any excess water drain away. Watering from above can cause

the plant to rot. Keep the root ball moist and you can feed every three weeks during the flowering period, though this is not strictly necessary unless you intend to keep the plant form year to year.

You will be bringing your Christmas trees inside soon. Always position them away from heat and prevent early needle drop by placing cut trees in water. You can mist the needles as well before you start decorating. Getting out the decorations is always a lovely job to look forward to. Enjoy the wonder of it all and have fun!


