

Dear Friends.








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Goldcrests

are all around us, but are not what you'd call common garden birds. They are insectivorous and rarely use feeders other than when times are hard and insects rare, when they will seek out fat balls or suet blocks, often in company with roving flocks of tits. They are tiny birds, only weighing around six grams, not much more than a 5p coin, and to store enough energy to get through winter nights, they are constantly flitting around in search of invertebrates such as spiders. Goldcrests are avid eaters of insects, as well as spiders and moth eggs. Their beaks have evolved to be thin and pointed, a tough and able instrument with which to pick out insects from among dense pine needles.

At this time of year, the British breeding population is boosted by migrants from Scandinavia and Russia. In the past, many people didn't believe that such a minute creature could manage sea crossings, leading to their being called 'Woodcock Pilots' as it was thought that they hitched a ride over the North Sea on the back of Woodcocks, a mainly nocturnal species of wading bird which tends to arrive for the winter at about the same time. Such a tiny bird would not seem capable of flying such a long distance. There are many reports of birds reaching the coast or landing on ships so exhausted that they ignore, indeed even land on, people, such is their need for food and rest.

Resident birds move around, but don't migrate. However, ringing has shown regular movements across the North Sea into Britain for the winter, one bird even coming from Russia and several from Poland, though Scandinavia is their usual point of origin. It seems amazing that any of them can survive two journeys as well as the cold weather, but some clearly do, as several Goldcrests ringed here in winter have been found back in Fennoscandia. Their arrival in numbers is dependent both on the weather and a successful breeding season, so I've no idea how many we can expect to see visiting this winter.

Goldcrests generally have multiple broods, the female regularly laying the second clutch of eggs before the first brood of nestlings has fledged. The male does the feeding while the female builds the new nest. The nest itself is very neat, being a spherical hammock in the outer twigs of a spruce or fir tree. This tremendous breeding effort can produce 20 chicks a year, something that is essential given the often high winter losses. After very cold winters, there may be only a quarter of the previous autumn's population left to breed.

Despite its energetic tit-like behaviour, the Goldcrest is very much a warbler in shape. Their plumage is olive above and buff white below, with darker wings displaying two prominent white wing bars; their most distinctive feature is an orange or yellow crown stripe flanked by a black edge. Adult males have a more orange crown stripe, females a more yellow stripe and juveniles lack the crown stripe altogether.



Goldcrests have a very high-pitched song that many people are unable to hear, (that's me, even with a 'tuned' hearing aid! This is when Merlin comes in handy.) which is a shame, as their song is sweet-sounding and is often the first or only indication that a Goldcrest is present. The commonest call is an equally high-pitched 'siii' used to keep group members together. Although Goldcrests have not featured prominently in literature, Charles Tennyson Turner did write one poem about them entitled 'The Gold-Crested Wren'. They are not Wrens (Troglodytes) but a separate species, Regulus regulus or 'kinglet'. Which name derives from the legend first written down by Aristotle, wherein the Goldcrest won the title King of Birds by hiding in the feathers of the soaring eagle and fluttering above it at its zenith, with the sun crowning its head.

All in the month of December

It was:

1750 years ago, on 25th 274 that the Roman Emperor Aurelian founded the cult of Sol Invictus as an official religion. He erected a temple and declared 25th December a national holiday, to be known as the Feast of the Unconquered Sun. In 336, after the conversion of the Emperor Constantine, 25th December began to be celebrated by the church in Rome as the birthday of God's Son.

500 years ago, on 24th 1524 that Vasco da Gama, Portuguese explorer, died of malaria. He was the first European to reach India by sea.

200 years ago, on 21st 1824 that James Parkinson, British surgeon and politician, died. He was the first person to describe Parkinson's disease, in 1817.

125 years ago, on 5th Dec 1899 that Henry Tate, British sugar merchant and philanthropist, died. He established the Tate Gallery in London.

Also 125 years ago, on 16th Dec 1899 that Noel Coward, British playwright, composer, director, actor and singer, was born. His plays include *Hay Fever*, *Private Lives*, and *Blithe Spirit*.

80 years ago, from 16th 1944 to 16th January 1945 that the Battle of the Bulge (Belgium) took place. German forces launched a surprise assault on the Allies in the Ardennes Forest – their last major counter-offensive operation of the war.

75 years ago, on 13th 1949 that Jerusalem became the capital of Israel, replacing Tel Aviv.

60 years ago, on 31st 1964 that Donald Campbell broke the world water speed record, and became the only person to break both the land speed record and the water speed record in the same year.

50 years ago, on 5th 1974 that the last episode of the TV comedy series *Monty Python's Flying Circus* was broadcast in the UK. It had begun in October 1969.

50 years ago, on 24th Dec 1974 that British politician John Stonehouse was arrested in Australia (on suspicion of being Lord Lucan.) He had faked his death on 20th November by leaving a pile of clothing on a beach in Miami Florida.

40 years ago, on 19th 1984 that the Sino-British Joint Declaration was signed by Britain and China. Britain agreed to return Hong Kong to Chinese sovereignty on 1st July 1997.

Also 40 years ago, on 31st 1984 that the Bank of England stopped producing one pound notes. They remained legal tender until 1988.

30 years ago, on 9th Dec 1994 that Sinn Fein held its first formal talks with the British government. This eventually led to the IRA ceasefire, the Good Friday Agreement, and the establishment of the Northern Ireland Assembly in 1998.

25 years ago, on 1st Dec 1999 that an international team of scientists working for the Human Genome Project announced that they had mapped an entire human chromosome (number 22). In April 2003 they announced that they had mapped all human chromosomes.

Also 25 years ago, on 2nd Dec 1999 that the UK devolved political power in Northern Ireland to the Northern Ireland Assembly and Executive Committee.

Also 25 years ago, on 31st Dec 1999 that the London Eye – the world's tallest Ferris wheel at the time, was officially opened on the banks of the River Thames. It opened to passengers in March 2000. 20 years ago, on 26th Dec 2004 that the Indian Ocean earthquake and tsunami (also called the Boxing Day Tsunami) took place. A massive undersea earthquake near Sumatra caused a devastating tsunami that swamped coastal areas in Indonesia, Sri Lanka, India, Thailand and East Africa. It was one of the deadliest natural disasters in recorded history, killing more than 230,000 people in 14 countries.

Ingredients

8oz Margarine or Butter 8oz Icing Sugar 1 Egg 1/4 lb Red label Chocolate * Plain broken biscuits Tablespoon rum Chocolate of choice to melt and decorate

- Mix all together
- Add in as many plain biscuits as the mixture will take
- Add the rum
- Place mixture into greaseproof paper
- Roll tightly and set aside for 3 days (use cling film)
- Turn out and ice with melted chocolate and decorate.






