



News from Norwood Chapel

Dear friends,

This is the month for remembering . . . remembering those who have been near and dear to us who have shown us the love of God and who now rest from their labours; remembering the Saints of the Christian faith if you're Anglican or Catholic; and remembering those who have served in the armed forces and sacrificed their lives for our freedom. We remember . . . and give thanks. (Just a note of clarification, the Methodist understanding of saint takes its inspiration from the New Testament, where a saint includes all Christian people of every time and place.)

Oftentimes when extended families get together, they tell stories of loved ones who have passed so the younger generations can learn more about them and what their lives were like. Even if young folks aren't around, I know my siblings and I like to share stories about our parents and grandparents, remembering the fun and meaningful times we had . . . or the lessons we learned from them. Remembering these things helps shape our understanding of who we are, where we've come from and the values we grew up with. Taking a walk down memory lane can be deeply gratifying as well as inspiring hope for the future.

This reminds me about another person who encouraged his closest friends to remember him every time they broke bread and shared wine. The world wasn't an easy place: there was political violence, food insecurity, poverty, ignorance, exploitation of the vulnerable and abuse of power by the elite. This man knew how broken the world was and he offered healing and wholeness in unexpected ways. He shared his power, gave respect to the outcasts, and turned society's values upside down. He bore the world's pain and sacrificed his life so that all generations could know forgiveness and new life. Funny enough, the world has been remembering him for over 2000 years!

May we continue to do so and follow his ways. More than ever before (it seems!) our world needs peace . . . not just a fleeting peace but a deep, lasting peace. From a Holy Communion liturgy from Iona, "not an easy peace, not an insignificant peace, not a half-hearted peace," . . . but a peace that passes all understanding, the peace of Christ.

As we remember in this month of November, may we continue to pray for world peace: for it to be obtained with words rather than by wounds; for lives to be spared; for mercy to rise up and melt cold hearts; and for there to be just outcomes following the cessation of war and conflict. May we be a people who pray, long for and work for all people to know God's peace.

The Birds in Your Garden



Bullfinches

Bullfinches, perhaps the most distinctive of our native finches were once a common garden visitor, but as with so many of our garden birds have suffered a steep decline in numbers since the 1960s. While the reasons for this are unclear, agricultural intensification, habitat loss and 'Bullfinch culling licences' issued during the 1960's are thought to have played a part. The population has seen slight increases in recent years but is still only about 40% of what it used to be. They can also suffer from trichomonosis, but we rarely see the same mass mortality events seen with Greenfinches and Chaffinches.

The male Bullfinch is a very smart looking bird, with a glossy black cap, coral pink breast and silvery grey back. Females are less flamboyant, but still very attractive to look at. The face of a Bullfinch gives a slightly 'squashed' appearance, with the beak being relatively short in length, but fairly deep in shape, emphasised by the facial plumage.

Bullfinches, like other members of the finch family, are predominantly seedeaters. However, in spring, to the annoyance of many a gardener, they will feed on growing flowers, shrubs and trees attracted by the sweet buds. Flower buds are chosen rather than leaf buds because they are nutritionally more rewarding, with cultivated varieties being their favourite, Man having selectively bred them to give a higher yield, which inevitably makes them more appealing to the Bullfinches! It's claimed that they can

eat up to 30 buds a minute! Hence the culls back in the 60s which were supposed to protect commercial growers.

Even in a good year, only around one in a dozen gardens will be lucky enough to have a visit from Bullfinches, making them a delightful addition when they do so. In the autumn, the BTO's Garden Bird Watch data reveal a dip in garden sightings, most likely due to the plentiful supply of natural foods available in the countryside. Once this food runs out, probably around now, Bullfinches will be back again and can often be seen on seed feeders, sunflower seeds seem to be their favourite food on the odd occasion they visit my garden.

Bullfinches appear to have a well-developed pair bond, often maintained throughout the year. They are sedentary, generally remaining in the same area throughout their lives, although they may move around during the winter months looking for feeding opportunities. They breed mainly in deciduous woodland, but will also use

large gardens, thickets and churchyards, and are shy birds, rarely being seen in the open, and seemingly visiting only those gardens that can be accessed via suitably thick cover.

In Victorian times Bullfinches were a popular captive bird because of their beautiful plumage and their call, a quiet low-pitched short whistle, or fluted 'phu' note. Come the spring, it's often this quiet song which lets you know that they are around. They are skilful mimics and it was once believed that the caged bird could be trained to mimic music, leading to the popular past-time of playing a special flute to them.

All in the month of November

It was: -

250 years ago, on 22 November 1774 that Robert Clive, 1st Baron Clive (Clive of India), died. He was the British general who helped found the British Empire in India.

150 years ago, on 23rd November 1874 that Thomas Hardy's novel *Far from the Madding Crowd* was published. It was his first major success.

125 years ago, from 2nd November 1899 to 28 Feb 1900 that the Siege of Ladysmith, a British Colony of Natal, took place. The Boers surrounded the town and cut off the rail link, starving the British defenders. A relief party, which included future British Prime Minister Winston Churchill, arrived on 28th February. British victory.

100 years ago, on 2nd November 1924 that the first crossword puzzle to appear in a British newspaper was published in the Sunday Express.

Also 100 years ago, on 29th Nov 1924 that Giacomo Puccini, Italian composer, died. Known for his operas, including *La Boheme, Tosca* and *Madame Butterfly*.

90 years ago, on 30th Nov 1934 that the British steam locomotive, *Flying Scotsman*, became the first train officially to reach 100 mph.

80 years ago, on 12th Nov 1944 that the British RAF bombed and sank the German battleship *Tirpitz*, sister ship of the *Bizmark*, off Norway.

70 years ago, on 3rd Nov 1954 that Henri Matisse died. This French artist was leader of the Fauvist movement and is seen as the most important French painter of the 20th century.

Also 70 years ago, on 13th November1954 that the first Rugby League World Cup Final was held, in Paris, France. Great Britain beat France 16 – 12. 65 years ago, on 1st Nov 1959 that the first stretch of the M1 motorway opened in Britain. Britain's first motorway service station also opened at Watford Gap.

60 years ago, on 23rd Nov 1964 that the Second Vatican Council allowed the use of vernacular languages (such as English) in Roman Catholic sacraments and rituals, including the Mass. It had insisted on using only Latin for several hundred years. Most people welcomed the change, and the use of Latin quickly dwindled.

50 years ago, on 8th November 1974 that Lord Lucan disappeared from his home in London after his children's nanny was bludgeoned to death and his wife was attacked. There were hundreds of claims of sightings around the world in the following years, but none were substantiated. He was never found and is presumed dead.

Also 50 years ago, on 20th Nov 1974 that British politician John Stonehouse faked his death by leaving a pile of clothing on a beach in Miami, Florida. He was found alive and well in Australia on 24th Decand was arrested on suspicion of being Lord Lucan.

Also 50 years ago, on 25th Nov 1974 that South African heart surgeon Dr Christian Barnard performed the world's first double heart transplant. The original heart was left in place and a donor heart was connected to it to support its workload.

40 years ago, on 20th Nov 1984 that SETI (the Search for Extra-Terrestrial Intelligence) was founded in Mountain View, California.


Also 10 years ago, on 27th Nov 2014 that P D James, British novelist, died. Best known for her crime novels featuring the detective, Adam Dalgliesh.

Ingredients

1lb Raisins
1LB Currants
1 lb Sugar
1LB Apples pealed and cored
1/2 LB Butter
1/4 lb Mixed Peel
Juice and rind of one lemon
1/2 Teaspoon mixed spice
A little nutmeg

Method

- Put all the ingredients in a large dish and combine thoroughly.
 Leave to rest over night.
- Simmer in the oven for 10 minutes
- Once cooled place in Sterilized jars to store until needed.
- The recipe makes 6 12oz jars store in a cool dry place to mature and use




